After a long list of accomplishments, despite COVID-19, the attendees then discussed other topics that they would like the Beloit League to consider for the coming year. The list will be reviewed by the board and then will come back to the membership at the Annual Meeting this April. The list includes:

- Civics knowledge
- Community corrections and how communities should be reflecting on the many needs of its diverse residents--especially the lack of mental health needs
- Communities needs for handling virtual education, especially rural areas
- Reimagining the justice system and progressive prosecutors
- Restorative justice
- Use of force in policing--what is happening locally
- Rock County environmental issues--ventilation, recyclables, water, etc.

State-wide Community Alliances Committee

The League of Women Voters of Beloit would like to make the following statement, at each of our future meetings, that we are located on the traditional territory of Indigenous peoples, and we want to respectfully acknowledge the Potawatomi, Peoria, Miami, Meskwaki, and Ho-Chunk (Winnebago) people who have stewarded this land throughout countless generations. We pay respects to their elders both past and present and, we consider the legacies of violence, displacement, and settlement that they have faced.

The Ho-Chunk Nation are one of the ancient occupiers of this geographic area. Ho-Chunk roughly translates as People of the Big Voice or People of the Sacred Voice. Their history says, "We have always been here" and evidence, including oral history, backs this up. Many of the effigy mounds across Wisconsin are attributed to the Ho-Chunk ancestors in tribute to the many spirits that dwell here. We honor them and their ancestors for their unwavering love and care of the land.
