## Creating a More Perfect Democracy

Across the nation, citizens will be celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the founding of the League of Women Voters of the United States on February 14, 2020. The League of Women Voters was formally organized in 1920 in Chicago as the national League of Women Voters, founded by Carrie Chapman Catt.



Catt described the purpose of the new organization: "The League of Women Voters is not to dissolve any present organization but to unite all existing organizations of women who believe in its principles. It is not to lure women from partisanship but to combine them in an effort for legislation which will protect coming movements, which we cannot even foretell, from suffering the untoward conditions which have hindered for so long the coming of equal suffrage. Are the women of the United States big enough to see their opportunity?"

It took time, but women and men across the nation seized the opportunity. The League of Women Voters of Wisconsin held its first convention in 1921. The League of Women Voters of Beloit was organized in March 1945.

There are 700 League chapters in the United States. League members are involved in projects and education to promote citizen education and participation in government. There is probably no other national organization in America that inspires such a great degree of commitment from its members. The LWV is successful because its members know their efforts do shape our way of life--in the greater Beloit area, Wisconsin, and in the United States.

After the awards, the event included food tasting, and student artwork displays commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

## People Powered Fair Maps/Redistricting Reform in WI

On Dec. 10, 2019, Pat Zody and I attended The Janesville League of Women Voters (and cosponsor History Department of UW Whitewater at Rock County), event with Erin Grunze, WI LWV executive director, speaking on LWUS People Powered Fair Maps<sup>™</sup> Campaign and specifically on Redistricting Reform in Wisconsin. The event was well attended with many people asking questions and talking about their experiences in working towards ending gerrymandering.

Since the federal courts are not intervening in addressing this issue, our state league has decided to work through the state legislature to pass redistricting reform. Currently there are two bills with bipartisan support, AB303 and SB288, that are currently held up in committee and deserve to get a public hearing and receive serious consideration by Wisconsin lawmakers. Erin encouraged us to contact all committee members even though we do not reside in their district, by pointing out to them that they are members of a state-wide committee, and as such they are responsible to all citizens of the state. I can provide a list of these committee members if anyone is interested.

Seventy percent of Wisconsin citizens support fair redistricting, eight counties have passed a referendum for reform, and 50 county boards have passed resolutions supporting fair maps. So why is the legislature not on board? Erin suggests that we focus our efforts for reform by doing grassroots activities such as increasing public awareness through presentations, writing letters to editors, spreading the word to acquaintances and friends, working with other grassroot organizations, and anything else we can think of. The Wisconsin Democracy Campaign has put together lots of information, including a Tool Kit, that she suggested we access: <a href="https://www.wisdc.org/reforms/support-fair-voting-maps">https://www.wisdc.org/reforms/support-fair-voting-maps</a>

Another part of the presentation discussed Iowa's non-partisan redistricting method to develop fair maps. In Iowa, legislative and congressional district lines are decided by a nonpartisan committee called the Legislative Services Agency. Each decade, a temporary Redistricting Advisory Commission is created and advises the Agency when asked. Erin suggested this could be a method for Wisconsin to consider (see the wisdc.org website for more information). Erin concluded the presentation saying, **"We don't want red maps. We don't want blue maps. We want fair maps."**

Don't have a WI driver license or ID card? Complete a paper registration form or complete one online and print it out. Proof of residence is required.
