


















BACKGROUND ON DELAWARE FUNDING


AVERAGE REVENUES PER PUPIL BY DISTRICT (2016-17)

CURRENT RESOURCE INEQUITIES

HOW MUCH money matters, and also HOW WELL it is spent.

Students from low-income families are far less likely to be enrolled in higher-level math in 8th grade than their higher income peers.

Districts serving more students from low-income families tend to have lower average teacher salaries than districts serving primarily students from historically advantaged groups.

Schools with more students from low-income families and students of color are more likely to have novice teachers.



Delaware has made some progress in providing additional funding for students from low-income families and English learners.

FY18 Opportunity Grants

\$1M in competitive grants to a handful of districts/charters

FY20 Opportunity Funding

\$60M (over three years) in formula grants

This is real progress in the right direction

This is an additional \$500 per English learner and \$300 per low-income student, or about 2-3% more per student.

Looking Ahead

Research suggests systems should provide 100% to 200% more

Regional neighbors invest 30-99% more



How does Delaware compare to other states?

Delaware is one of 8 states that relies solely on a resource allocation-based funding system.



Other states that use a resource allocation-based system exclusively:

Alabama, Idaho, Illinois, South Dakota, Tennessee, Washington, West Virginia, and Wyoming.



2. AGREEMENT ON PRINCIPLES

The Vision Coalition of Delaware heard broad agreement that ...

- How much money is allocated matters, but how well it's used to support student success matters just as much.
- Delaware's current funding system has strengths to build upon, but also opportunities to improve.
- Change will require a gradual transition, not flipping a switch overnight. There are things the state could do immediately that would have a positive impact for students.
- To work best for all students, a funding system should have the following principles: equity, flexibility, stability, and transparency.

3. LEARN LESSONS FROM OTHER STATES

Most states in the nation have updated their funding system, can inform our transition process

Foundation Formula (33 States)

- 1. Determine foundation/base amount
- 2. Count students with weights
- Multiply student count by the foundation amount
- 4. Determine state vs. local split
- 5. Add on outside funding *(capital, transportation, other)*



States Adopting New Formulas

 Since 2000 several states have have new school funding formulas:

Arkansas (2002) Litigation

- California (2013) Governor led/voter approved

– Kansas (2014) First litigation then legislative led

– Maryland (2002) Legislative led change

– Ohio (2013) First litigation then legislative led

Pennsylvania (2015)
 Rhode Island (2010)
 Legislative led change

- Wyoming (2001) Litigation



















































Our Goals

Increase Transparency and Engagement

- Grow the coalition
- Build public understanding of how the system works and how money is allocated
- Advocate for schoollevel funding data that is comparable across the state so that we can understand our state's investments in education

Update Education Funding System

Address how much funding is provided for students with greater needs, AND how well all funds are allocated, ensuring money follows students and meets their individual needs
Learn lessons from other states and undergo the recommended process of gradually transitioning to a system where funding follows students and high-needs students get what they deserve

Better Serve Delaware's Students

- Create the conditions that will allow for increased student learning
 - Great leaders are attracted to flexible, adequate resources— and great teachers stay where leadership is strong. Flexible, student-based resources can be targeted, and spent innovatively to address the holistic needs of diverse learners. A simpler, transparent system allows taxpayer and parent engagement
