#### - Beloit LWV delves into study of HOMELESSNESS: -

At the spring Annual Meeting, our Beloit League voted to undertake a study of homelessness. To initiate the study we're reading the bestselling and acclaimed book, **Evicted: Poverty and Profit in the American City** by Matthew Desmond. Included here are some of the comments in an interview published in 'magazine@ habitat.org'.

The 2017 Pulitzer prize-winning book is a deep dive into the eviction landscape in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and is told through the stories of families Desmond lived with while researching his book.

Desmond's findings surprised even him. Among them were: the sheer numbers of families being turned out of their homes; the high cost of shoddy apartments in the poorest neighborhoods; and the extent of the physical and emotional toll on families, most of them women with children.

Desmond says, "I think that without stable shelter, everything else falls apart. If you are a typical poor working family today, you are spending at least half of your income on housing costs, and sometimes you are spending 60, 70 percent of your income just on rent and utilities. Under those conditions, you are unable to buy enough food sometimes. And you face eviction at a really high rate, which not only can result in you losing your home, but can result in you losing all sorts of other stuff, too, like your possessions, your school, your community."

There is a growing gap between what poor families are bringing in and what they have to pay for basic shelter. It has reached a point where we have moved from a time when evictions used to be rare and draw a crowd to a point that you go to a major American city like Milwaukee where 1 in 8 renters is evicted every two years. That is an astounding level of residential insecurity. What's going on in that city mirrors what's going on around the United States and even the world, but Desmond still believes the landscape can change if there's the will to change it.

#### The LWV-Upper Mississippi River Region Inter League

#### **Organization** First, what is an ILO?

Inter-League Organizations (ILO) are comprised of local Leagues within a county, metropolitan area or region that form to address county, metropolitan or regional governmental issues. An ILO may also operate under the Natural Resources positions of the LWV.

ILOs adopt bylaws, hold annual or biennial conventions at which all Leagues in the ILO are represented, elect officers and directors, choose program, and approve a budget. ILOs are formally recognized by the LWVUS Board and are entitled to send one voting delegate to LWVUS conventions.

ILOs are established because their members recognize the need to work together at the regional level to most effectively and responsibly solve problems that transcend political boundaries.

#### **UMRR ILO**

LWV's newest ILO, the **League of Women Voters Upper Mississippi River Region** officially came into existence on October 24, 2015. Its mission is to advocate on environmental issues involving the Mississippi River Region.

Almost 50 local LWVs in Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, and Wisconsin responded when asked to commit to joining the new UMRRILO. In recognition of this strong interest, the LWV-US gave the ILO Steering Committee the "go ahead" to formally organize. For our local LWV to become a member league of the ILO, the board simply voted to do so, then sent an annual dues payment of \$25.00. Watch future newsletters for more information.
