FROM THE PRESIDENT

Nobody will ever deprive the American people of the right to vote except the American people and the only way they could do this is by not voting. -- Franklin D. Roosevelt

How true!! Actually, voting used to be fairly easy. All you had to do was decide who/what you wished to vote for and then head off to the polls on election day to cast your ballot. You even could make it a social event by seeing friends and neighbors and catching up on the news/gossip of the day. Yet, as easy and pleasant as that could be, there were still those among us who didn't feel the need to exercise that very important right.

As the election draws nearer, we find that this year, voting has become a bit more complicated. This time you have options. You may choose to mail in your ballot, or go to the polls on election day and cast your vote in the traditional method. That seems simple until you factor in a very dangerous and unseen enemy, the COVID-19 virus. You must now think carefully about the safety of each of these options. If you follow the science, mail-in voting is the safest. Masks are not required and social distancing is a snap.

The most important thing about mail-in voting are the deadlines. The deadline for applying for your mail-in ballot is October 27th. Please bear in mind that this is only 7 days prior to the election. Your application will need to be processed and a ballot sent to you. You must then complete that ballot and it must physically arrive at the Election Office by 8:00pm. This is a terribly tight timeframe!!

Our advice is to apply for your mail-in ballot NOW! As soon as the ballot arrives (they have not yet been released), fill it out and send it in the enclosed self-address stamped envelope as soon as possible!! This gives plenty of time for processing and assures your vote is counted.

The second option for voting is the traditional in-person method. Again, we are encouraging you do this as safely as possible. By now it is a familiar strain; wear masks, social distance, increase hand hygiene, and go to the polls during low volume periods.

As always, the LWVLA wants you and everyone, to vote. To be redundant: please vote promptly and by all means, please vote safely.

People fought for our right to do this; let's not disappoint them!

SEPTEMBER FORUM

Dr. Scott Meinke gave the September 15th Forum, on assorted electoral reforms in theory and practice. His thesis was that electoral reforms often have unintended consequences hence do not necessarily improve the democratic process. Among the reforms he discussed were: early voting, campaign financing, redistricting, and term limits. Interestingly among all those reforms Dr. Meinke stated that political scientists unanimously oppose term limits reform. For the others, he discussed several pros and cons.

The presentation was followed by a first for our local League: a Zoom discussion of the issues raised in the forum talk. Two breakout rooms met for thirty minutes in lively discussion of the unintended consequences of electoral reform. In one of the groups we were fortunate to have a former mayor of Bloomsburg who was able to discuss, based on her experience, the likely implications of term limits. The League will continue to experiment with break out rooms this fall, so plan to join us to discuss polarization in October and the pandemic in November.

MAUCH MILLENNIAL PROJECT

Cosponsored by the LWVLA and the Bucknell University Political Science Department, Mauch Fellowships are typically awarded to two Bucknell students in election years. The students are charged with holding forums for their fellow students on issues relating to that year's election.

Last spring, the subcommittee was so impressed with the quality of the applicants that we selected three winners: Jerra Holdip '23, Annie Maley '21, and Maya McKeever '21. When they began planning for the fall forums, they didn't know whether in-person meetings would be feasible or not, but the students' creativity and flexibility paid off.

The first forum took place on September 15th via Zoom. The topic was "The Impact of Covid-19 on the 2020 Election and Mail-in Voting." The Fellows' list of discussion questions for the group, included:

- To what extent will Covid-19 influence voter preferences this election?
- Will incumbency have a stronger or weaker effect this year because of the current global uncertainty?
- How do you think mail-in voting will impact voter turnout?

The PowerPoint presentation included information on how to register in PA, how to request an absentee ballot, and a list of polling sites in Union County, as well as information about how to register and vote in a student's hometown. Jerra reports that the conversation among the approximately 20 students who attended was especially lively around the topic of voting accessibility and the ways in which some groups have easier access to voting than others.

It provides candidates' information and their responses to questions, it allows you to create your own customized, completed ballot, and it provides links to websites where you can review your voter registration, apply for a mail-

in ballot, and track your application and ballot.

Our League will **not** be presenting Candidates Nights for this November election.
