NOVEMBER FORUM



On November 16th, Sue Ellen Henry, Professor of Education at Bucknell University, presented a talk entitled, "Critical Race Theory and The Public Schools." A recording of this talk is available on our LWVLA Website at:

Professor Henry is also the author of *Children's Bodies in Schools: Corporeal Performances of Social Class*, which explores the influence of social class position on nonverbal communication in schools.

Critical Race Theory (CRT) has been described as a legal theory — a structured explanation for racial discrimination. It provides tools to critique patterns of racial inequality and other oppressive forces in society and in students' lives. It provides multiple points of view on events and issues in American history challenging social practices and social hierarchies. CRT has been criticized as interfering with the bonds that hold people together and being racially divisive. In response, some legislatures have banned the teaching of CRT; there have been public protests; use of "opt out" forms for parents has broadened; parent and student "Bills of Rights" had been adopted. Pennsylvania has proposed a House Bill for "Curriculum Transparency" to amend a March, 1949 act.

In response to anti-bias training on the federal level, in September 2020, a White House executive order forbid diversity training in Federal contractors and in January 2021 the White House issued the "1776 Report," advancing a "patriotic education" as opposed to inclusion and multiple points of view. Critics of CRT have said that "Fighting racism is racism." Professor Henry discussed what such concerns mean for teachers and anti-racism education. Her presentation was animated and interesting and was followed by a very active question and answer session.

Vote411 Numbers – US, PA, and Local races

Nationwide, **Vote411** educated more voters in 2021 than in any other odd-year election cycle! Over 1.7 million sessions were logged from January 1st through Election Day, and over 1.1 million of those sessions included the online voters' guides.

In Pennsylvania, **Vote411** use in 2021 was more than double what it was in 2017. Statewide, **Vote411** had over 120,000 users and more than 150,000 sessions in 2021.

In Union, Snyder and Northumberland Counties, where we covered at least some races, there were more than 750 **Vote411** users and more than 1,000 **Vote411** sessions in 2021. For the November 2021 ballots in our county, 100% of state candidates and 75% of local candidates entered information into **Vote411**! The overall candidate response rate for the Fall 2021 Union County *Voters Guide* was 77%.

Thanks go to Sheri Stayton and Liz Clement for their outstanding effort and persistence to achieve these results for Pennsylvania and the local candidates.
