#### **JANUARY FORUM**

Dennis Lyons, Editor of *The Daily Item*, spoke to the LWVLA on January 19<sup>th</sup> via Zoom about "Real News When We Need It Most." He noted some changes in things that we used to take for granted: the paper is published 6 days a week; online readership has increased; after the November election, on a given day, 35% of voters did not believe the person elected president had won. There always have been satire and propaganda; "fake news" was used as a term as early as John Adams. Today it is used by some people for anything with which they do not agree.

The Daily Item focuses on local news, uses reliable sources like the Washington Post and the AP for national and international news, then adds local context. The First Amendment does not mean a requirement to publish letters without verifiable facts. All letters to the editor must be signed. Staff training emphasizes avoiding terms that reflect bias in reporting.

Breakout session discussions, led by Susan Jordan and Karen Carr from the Central Susquehanna Valley Mediation Center, focused on how to have constructive conversations with people with whom we have differing views.

#### **FEBRUARY FORUM**

Nicole Peterson, Union-Snyder Community Action Agency Food Security Coordinator, spoke at the February 16th LWVLA Forum on, "What is food security and how do we reach sustainable food security in our region?" The USDA defines food insecurity as "lack of access at times to sufficient nutritious food." Based on 2018 figures, 21% of Northumberland, Snyder, and Union residents fall into that category; a 5% increase is projected due to the Covid pandemic. Some factors that play into food insecurity include: chronic illness (i.e. 50% of Union County's food-insecure have high blood pressure; 30% of food-insecure families include one person with diabetes); lack of health insurance; senior populations; limited educational levels; and lack of other government assistance, despite 80% of families with one member working qualifying for SNAP food assistance. Exacerbating problems can include lack of transportation and affordable housing; inadequate kitchen facilities, nutritional information, or budgeting skills. Ms. Peterson explored some of the solutions local coalitions are working on such as food pantries, community gardens, farmers' markets, and school meal food distribution for non-school days. Local food hubs like the one established at the Miller Center are promising innovations.

Voter Services members met virtually with Director Greg Katherman and his staff, Glenda Radel and Kathy Reedy, on February 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2021. We discussed the past election process and future process issues, and offered our assistance for future elections.

#### **Ballot Questions in the Primary Election**

The Spring 2021 Primary Election will contain several ballot questions:

- PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

   ARTICLE III, SECTION 9: Termination
   or Extension of Disaster Emergency
   Declarations
  - JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2021-1 proposes to amend the Pennsylvania Constitution to provide a new exception to traditional legislative procedure by allowing the General Assembly to terminate or extend a disaster emergency declaration or a portion of such declaration without needing the Governor's approval.
- PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

   ARTICLE IV: Disaster Emergency

  Declaration and Management

  Shall the Pennsylvania Constitution be

  amended to change existing law so that: a

  disaster emergency declaration will expire

  automatically after 21 days, regardless of the

Shall the Pennsylvania Constitution be amended by adding a new section providing that equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of an individual's race or ethnicity?

The remaining hour of the video addresses judicial gerrymandering and HB 38, which is not a ballot question this election.

Voter Services will be discussing the above ballot questions and the best way to educate our community. We want to educate and encourage all voters to participate in the May primary, regardless of party affiliation, especially Independent and 3rd-party voters, those registered with neither major party who often forego primary elections. We will also discuss our concerns over the potential rollback of election rights through the 14 legislative bills introduced by the current majority in the PA House of Representatives.
