

TALL CITY FOR TOMORROW

This is the title of a shared vision for the future of Midland. A guide for public policy and a tool for setting priorities.

The planning process will be a year in length. There have been public meetings with more planned for the future. Also, group online discussions with City development planners to get input from citizens.

Notes from Pat Schneider, who attended several of the early meetings:

The project kicked off September 2014 with meetings with city staff and professional city planners, followed by online and other media events. The first town hall group meetings were open to the public. They were held on: Tuesday, Nov. 11, 2014: evening meeting with presentation of scope; Wednesday, Nov 12, 2014: layout of problems and some suggestions for changes and innovations for the future. This was held 11:30 to 1:00 pm at Centennial Library. Citizens were asked to look at displays and make written or oral comments; Thursday, Nov 13, 2014: 30-minute power point presentation of areas to be covered in each section of the city: North, South, East, West, Eastside-Edge, Airpower area, Gateway corridor, and central City.

The topics to be discussed in each area are:

Infrastructure

Residential

Congestion Points

Amenities

Connectivity

Service

Drilling

Annexation

Aging of Structures

RR Barrier

Water District Issues

Zoning

Future Developments—residential, commercial & airport

Future plans for research and discussion will involve city staff and citizens. All of which will be reported on-line every month, so public will have access. February 2015, there will be a Community "Open House" for further discussion, followed by distribution of a draft action plan. Another open house for the community is planned for September 2015.

Early Childhood Education Ideas to "spark" discussion...



"There are more than one million low-income families with young children in Texas, ranking second only to California," said Ann Beeson, executive director of the Center for Public Policy Priorities in Austin. "Today's children will become tomorrow's workers and leaders, and the state must invest in education for children and job training for adults so that Texans of all backgrounds can reach their full potential."

The KIDS COUNT® policy report, Creating Opportunity for Families: A Two-Generation Approach, outlines how the public, nonprofit and private sectors must work together to reduce poverty among the 10 million low-income families with young children in the United States. The recommendations propose integrating state and federal employment, education and child care programs for parents and children to create better opportunities for the entire family.

Key findings:

"More than a third of Texas children age five or younger in low-income families have parents with concerns about their development."

"For 43 percent of Texas low-income families with young children, neither parent has a full-time job. In 85 percent of low-income families, neither parent has an associate's degree, which dramatically highlights the need to equip parents who have limited education with skills that can help them earn a family-supporting income."
