

Letter from the President

July/August 2023

Dear LWVSC Friends,

The summer is rushing by in its usual way, and suddenly we're hurtling towards August. This swift passage of time reminds me how very quickly our climate continues to worsen. This morning, I was struck by two articles in the *New York Times*. The first reported on the serious drought situation in Iran. Due to mismanaged government policies in certain areas, the water consumption has outstripped the supply to such an extent that there is now <u>no way</u> to reverse the depletion. The lack of water has caused the temperatures to rise as high as 135 F degrees. It is now predicted that some of the southern provinces will lose <u>their entire water supply</u> by this Fall.

On the opposite page, I read about the evacuation of 19,000 people from the Greek island of Rhodes as wildfires continue to rage there. At the same time, heat waves have caused temperatures elsewhere in Greece to rise 110 F degrees and higher. Closer to home, fires continue to burn in Canada, while dangerous floods have caused "unimaginable" damage in Nova Scotia. Unfortunately, these reports are not anomalies or coincidences but clear evidence that climate change is moving at a faster pace with increasing devastation.

Climate change is not affecting any one country or area, it's happening everywhere. I'm certainly not a scientist, but I feel that whether due to lack of water or too much water, heat waves or drought, we will begin to see climate migrations, complicating an already steady stream of refugees and migrants across the world.

But I'm still hopeful..... and I'm proud of the League of Women Voters, State Leagues, and local Leagues like our own for supporting a scientific approach to our climate:

"Since the 1960s, (the League) we have been at the forefront of efforts to protect air, land, and water resources. Our approach to environmental protection and pollution control is one of problem-solving. The League's environmental goals aim to prevent ecological degradation and to reduce and control pollutants before they go down the sewer, up the chimney or into the landfill. We support vigorous enforcement mechanisms, including sanctions for states and localities that do not comply with federal standards as well as substantial fines for noncompliance." (excerpt from LWVUS Policy on the Environment)

Let's re-commit ourselves to support, educate, and vote for sound, science-based strategies to slow and hopefully mitigate our rapidly changing climate.

LWV-NYS 2023 Convention

We represented our League at the biennial LWV-NYS Convention in June — a two-day whirlwind of workshops, speakers and connecting with members from across the state. Highlights included Keynote speaker Carolyn Maloney's talk about the renewed push in Congress to pass the federal ERA and student-led efforts to make that happen; and "Moments in the Sun," where League members shared ideas for voter and community outreach, and their partnership initiatives with local non-profits. It also introduced the Rural Caucus, which brings to the League the unique perspective of rural communities.

Takeaways and news from Convention workshops:

Communications is Key. To make sure your audience gets the message, it has to be clear and simple, express the values you are trying to convey and, most important, make an emotional connection with the listener. Presenting a laundry list of goals and ideas – no matter how worthy – causes people to tune out.

Election Law: Voter information is public record, but victims of domestic violence can now apply to keep their records confidential. Soon, driver's license applicants will automatically be registered to vote, unless they opt out.

The Voting and Jail Project: Many citizens detained in jail while awaiting trial or serving misdemeanor sentences do not have consistent access to their right to vote. This is a missed opportunity to encourage behaviors that have been linked to better reintegration back into society and decreased recidivism. Our League is looking into establishing a program in Schenectady County.

Volunteers Needed for Candidate Forums September and October 2023

The League of Women Voters of Schenectady County will sponsor four candidate forums before the general election on November 7. These forums, or "meet the candidate" sessions are designed to stimulate voter interest and knowledge of the issues and to encourage voter participation in elections. All candidates for office who meet New York State election law requirements and are certified by the Schenectady County Board of Elections are invited to take part in a forum. We have an excellent track record of hosting informative and relevant discussions that engage candidates and voters in a nonpartisan manner.

The League has always depended on member volunteers to staff the forums and these volunteers are central to our success. The candidate forums are scheduled for the following dates:

Niskayuna: Thursday 9/21, 6:30 - 8:30 Glenville: Wednesday 9/27, 7:00 - 9:00 Rotterdam: Thursday 10/5, 6:00 - 7:30

Schenectady: Wednesday 10/11, 6:00 - 7:45

We are seeking volunteers for these positions:

Time Keepers: The Time Keeper will use a stopwatch and warning cards to maintain control of the time during the forum. They will be required to politely but firmly stop a candidate who is attempting to speak beyond the allotted time.

Ushers: The Ushers will ensure that the room is ready by checking the placement of tables and chairs, placing nameplates and water bottles for candidates, and ensuring all necessary items are in place. Additionally, the Ushers will distribute programs and index cards for questions from the audience, as well as welcoming the candidates and community members.

Question Reviewers: The Question Reviewers will review the index cards submitted by audience members to avoid duplication of questions and remove inappropriate questions or comments.
