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LWVUS to Nation: Channel Your Rage Into Voting

On 5/29/20, the LWVUS issued the following statement, which you can read online **here**



The League of Women Voters grieves the murders of George Floyd and the countless other Black lives that have been tragically taken at the hands of rogue law enforcement officers who are rarely held fully accountable for their actions.

We also mourn those who have lost their lives or been harmed, mentally or physically, as a result of America's pervasive culture of anti-blackness. The systems of oppression that have perpetuated the myth of white supremacy in our country must be dismantled if we are ever to become the nation we pledge to be—indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

As an organization whose mission is to empower voters and defend democracy, we stand in solidarity with all Black communities. The League shall do so not only by speaking out against racism in all forms, but by doing the work required of us to be anti-racist. We are committed to listening to and amplifying Black voices, and educating ourselves and our children on the historic and ongoing systemic racism that plagues this country.

The League acknowledges, painfully, that America is a nation founded on racism. Therefore, all who live in this country must contribute to and participate in organizations actively working to achieve full liberation and inclusive freedom. We must all advocate for anti-racist policies at every level of government.

We join the League of Women Voters of Minnesota in calling on law enforcement officials to provide transparency during this investigation, and to seek justice for George Floyd, his family, and his community.

Finally, we echo the call of our partners at the NAACP: we must all vote in November – the road to change lies at the ballot box.

We commend the Minnesota, Minneapolis, and St. Paul Leagues for their leadership in their communities at this trying time and the national office stands with you. You can read the Minnesota League statement **here**.

In these trying times, the League's commitment to democracy requires us to speak out against racism and violence. I hope you will join me in this commitment by doing the work required of us to be an anti-racist organization.

HOW TO VOTE IN THE JUNE 9 ELECTIONS

For the School board election, the vote is being conducted by "**absentee ballot**," with completed ballots **due no later than June 9, 2020, at 5 p.m.** All ballots are in the mail to registered voters as of 5/29. The envelope you will receive contains two envelopes and a ballot inside. You must fill out your ballot, voting for two candidates; insert the ballot into the first envelope; then sign, date and seal the first envelope --- the so-called "OATH" envelope; then put that one in the postage-paid envelope addressed to the School District.

The District has also arranged to have a lockbox cart stationed on the ground floor at City Hall, near the security guard. New Rochelle voters may drop off their "absentee" envelopes in that manner up until Tuesday, June 9, 2020, at 5 p.m. This is available to those who fear that their mailed ballots might not make the deadline.

The **dates for ballot drop-off** at City Hall are:

- Monday-Friday, June 1 through June 5, from 8:00 a.m. 4:30 p.m.;
- Monday, June 8, from 8:00 AM 4:30 p.m.; and
- Tuesday, June 9, from 8:00 AM 5:00 p.m.


If you are dropping off the ballot in person, approach the City Hall entrance from the parking lot off Beaufort Place. You will not be able to enter City Hall as it is closed to the general public due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but a security guard will be present. If you tell the guard you are there to vote, the guard will alert Mr. Ron Fortune, a District employee, election Board of Registration Member and Certified Election Inspector. Mr. Fortune will bring the lockbox cart to you. Insert your envelope into the slot in the lockbox. Mr. Fortune will be responsible for the lockbox at all time. He will follow social distancing guidelines, and will wear a mask and gloves.

The canvas of the vote will begin on June 9, 2020 after 5 p.m. Every effort will be made to count the votes in one night, but this is dependent on the number of votes received. The canvasing process will be live streamed for transparency. Nurses will be present during the canvassing.

You can **VOTE EARLY IN PERSON** for the June 23 elections, from 6/13-6/21. See Westchester County BOE for info.

- June 16 Last day to postmark an application or letter of application by mail or send an email or fax for an absentee ballot.
- June 22 Last day to apply IN-PERSON for absentee ballot.
- June 22 Last day to postmark ballot. Must be received by the local board of elections no later than June 30th.
- June 23 Last day to deliver ballot IN-PERSON to the local board of elections (by someone other than the voter.)

The LWV of Westchester will host a forum via Zoom on **Sunday, June 7**, 5 - 6:30 pm for candidates running in the June 23 Democratic Primary to represent Congressional District 16.

The CD-16 area includes parts of northern Bronx, Ardsley, Eastchester, parts of Greenburgh, Hastings, Larchmont, Mamaroneck, Mt Vernon, New Rochelle, Pelham, Rye City, parts of Rye town, parts of Scarsdale, and Yonkers.

The candidates include Jamaal Bowman, Elliot Engel, Chris Fink, Andom Ghebreghioris snd Sammy Ravelo. The moderator for the candidate forum is a LWV trained resident from outside of CD 16.

The League of Women Voters of New Rochelle hosted a virtual candidates forum via Zoom for the June 9 election of two Board of Trustees members for the New Rochelle Public Library. The three candidates were recorded on Tuesday, May 26 and the forum can be viewed via the New Rochelle League's web site, http://www.newro.org/. Debbie Reisner was the moderator. John Hessel provided the technical direction.

The three candidates were Charles F. Burke, Corey Galloway, and David J. Mener. A trained League moderator from outside New Rochelle conducted the forum. Voters submitted questions by email to <u>LWVNewRochelle@gmail.com</u>.

The June 9 election will task voters to choose candidates for the New Rochelle Public Library Board of Trustees, to fill two empty seats on the New Rochelle Board of Education, and to vote on the 2020-2021 School budget. There will be no 2020-21 Library budget vote this year because there is no increase from the present Library budget.

The vote will be by absentee ballot, which will be mailed out with a postage free return envelope to voters on or around May 25, to be returned to the Board of Elections by June 9.



LWVNR "Ballot Box" on WVOX: Dr. Faulkner Returned in May for Discussion on What The History of Women's Suffrage Teaches About Empowerment

The Ballot Box is the monthly WVOX 1460 AM radio show of the League of Women Voters of New Rochelle. Co-hosted by LWVNR members Tamar Tait and Nina Luban, the show features local, state, and national electoral issues and relevant civic matters. In April, The Ballot Box hosted Dr. Carol Faulkner, author, Syracuse University professor and 19th century American history specialist.

New Rochelle Proposes \$283M School Budget

New Rochelle residents will vote by mail on June 9 this year to approve the district's proposed 2020-2021 school budget. The district held a public hearing on the proposed budget on May 28.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo has warned that the economic effect of the shutdown imposed to curb the outbreak could mean much less money available for state education aid. The state will be assessing and adjusting its budget several times in the course of 2020. Cuomo's last estimate was that state aid would be 20 percent lower than already promised.

New Rochelle Public Schools has not yet determined what it has lost in state aid, but the district's budget grew by 1.02 percent, or \$2,863,535, from the 2019-2020 school year. ---Patch, 5/18/2020




