Redistricting Voting Rights Improving Elections Campaign Finance/Money in Politics

Members also Concurred on the Electoral Systems Position. These items will be adopted at the LWVUS Convention 2020 this June.



Local Program Planning Meeting February 20, 2020

A Local program is adopted annually, State and National programs are two-year programs adopted in alternation years at conventions.

LWVF will be meeting on February 20th for the LOCAL Program Planning. The recommendations presented at this meeting will be presented for adoption at our Falmouth League Annual Meeting in May.

On the local level good ideas for programs often come from board members, especially chairmen of current studies who may wish to continue or pursue another facet of the existing study. Observer Corps members may also have suggestions based on situations they have observed. During State and National planning, Leagues elsewhere may send communications soliciting support at convention for their program ideas. Joanne Voorhis Writes:

The league members at all three levels (local, state and national) choose an issue to study. A Committee studies that issue and presents it to the membership to reach a consensus on action. This Feb 20 our local league will have the opportunity to select an issue to study for the next year. Please look in the back of your Membership Directory to see the stands we currently have. 
OBSERVER CORPS PRESENTATIONS

Representing the Falmouth League as a member of the Observer Corps involves a commitment to regular attendance at committee meetings and careful notetaking. Our current Observer Corps members have been excellent examples. There will be at least three Observers delivering their reports and answering questions at the February 20 meeting in Town Hall Civil Defense Room at 7:00pm.



NATURAL RESOURCES

Richard Johnson, Chair

Mass Power Forward, a consortium of progressive activist groups, organized a Lobby Day on January 14, 2020 at the State House which was attended by 200+ people interested in progressive politics, sustainable energy and a greener economy. We lobbied our legislators to support H.2810 (An Act to Promote Green Infrastructure and Reduce Carbon Emissions), H.3008 (An Act to Advance Modern and Sustainable Solutions for Transportation), H. 4264 (An Act Relative to Environmental Justice), and H.2836 (100% Renewable

Energy for All) among others. On behalf of LWVF Natural Resources Committee, Richard Johnson met with Rep. Dylan Fernandes who is a cosponsor on each of those bills: no eloquence was needed to encourage him to support these bills. As a resident of Woods Hole, he understands the urgent need to address the causes of the climate crisis.

At noon, dozens of activists rallied outside Governor Baker's office to protest his continued support of fossil fuel-based



infrastructure, such as Liquified Natural Gas and other pipeline projects. These are not in line with a future of sustainable energy, as well as being dangerous and blighting to their host communities.

There was an overflowing attendance at a joint Senate/House hearing on Carbon Pricing in the afternoon; every seat was filled and people stood all along the walls and sat over the entire floor, with easily an equal number of people in the corridors outside. Testimony was taken from the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs on progress on the Transportation and Climate Initiative to drive down vehicle emissions; from the mayor of Somerville which has its own Climate Change initiative responding to the Paris Accord; and from four university economists who demonstrated that carbon pricing in other economies have been successful in driving down emissions



without negative impacts wages, jobs economv of the or the 18 nations/provinces studied. They noted that the provisions of H.2810 provide rebates from the tax on transportation and heating fuels to low and middleincome households and rural communities who fewer have alternative heating or transportation options. Other groups continued to testify into the afternoon. There was a clear sense of urgency in the room.

CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE Richard Johnson, Chair

The Centennial Grove Project has received \$3108 in donations from (or in honor of) 42 individuals or families, whose names will be included in the Annual Meeting Program. We will be selecting trees at the nursery in the next

two months and expect to plant these at Peterson Farm with a bronze plaque set in a large stone at the end of April or early May. There is not enough parking there for us to witness the planting with a large group, but we will have photos at the Annual Meeting.

Elaine Weiss will be speaking at the Falmouth Forum on February 21 at 7:30pm, co-sponsored by our League. Elaine is a journalist and author of "The Woman's Hour: The Great Fight for the Vote" about the ratification of the 19th Amendment in Tennessee This presentation will be at Lillie Auditorium in Woods Hole.

We are planning to have a public screening of "Iron Jawed Angels", a film about Alice Paul and the Suffrage movement, but have not yet firmed up a date; late February or early March are likely. Please check the website from time to time for details.

Olivann Hobie has been preparing short snippets on the Suffrage Movement in Falmouth and elsewhere which are being published in the Falmouth Enterprise.

Legislative Program March 19 7:00 pm by Judy Ziss

"Voting: Let's Get It Right!" That is the focus of the Legislative Committee's program, scheduled for Thursday, March 19, 2020, at 7:00 p.m. in the Hermann Room of the Falmouth Public Library. This program will feature a panel discussion during which our two state Representatives, David Vieira and Dylan Fernandes, can converse with Town Clerk Michael Palmer about election-oriented legislation currently before the Massachusetts legislature.

The pending bills cover a wide spectrum. Several bills, all supported by the Massachusetts League, are designed to **make voting more convenient**. There also is one bill, opposed by the Massachusetts League, which threatens to restrict voting by requiring photo IDs at the polls. A second group of bills **relate to the vote-counting process**. The final group of bills **impact the candidate-pool**.

Our March 19 format is designed to promote consideration of the proposed bills from both the legislative and administrative points of view. Hopefully, League members, the public, and maybe even the panelists will gain new insight as the discussion proceeds. Of course, League members and other members of the audience also will have the opportunity to ask questions and make comments.

Our program is devoted to voting issues in honor of our Centennial Year. Please come to **"Voting: Let's Get It Right!"** We hope it will be interesting and informative, and we may even have a brief humorous Centennial surprise for you.

Centennial Grove Project

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th Amendment to the US Constitution and the founding of the League of Women Voters, LWVF proposes to plant a grove of ten Tupelo trees, one for each decade, at a restored vernal pool at Peterson Farms. The site was selected with the Falmouth Tree Warden, Conservation Commission and 300 Committee. Trees will be watered the first year with the assistance of the local Girl Scouts and others, and an engraved boulder will be placed marking the grove.

Planting will take place in May 2020 on a date chosen by the Department of Public Works.

The engraved text will read:

In recognition of the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment to the United States Constitution and the Founding of the League of Women Voters, a grove of Tupelo Trees was planted on this site in 2020 by the League of Women Voters of Falmouth with the assistance of the Falmouth Conservation Commission.

To participate, LWVF is seeking donations in the amount of \$50 or more per individual. If you would also like to receive a 1 gallon Tupelo tree to plant in your own yard as an extension of the grove, please give \$35 per tree additional. Please send your donation so the trees can be ordered.
