LOCAL STUDY 2020-2021

The local study this year has been an assessment and updating of LWVF local positions which are listed in the purple LWVF 2020-2021 Membership Directory. The Land Use position was updated recently and was the only position not reviewed. The updates are included for review and will be voted on by members at the Annual meeting, May 20 via Zoom.

Thank you to the League members who provided expert advice, reviewed, and updated the LWVF positions: Joan Boyer, Peter Boyer, Alice Carey, Rosemary Carey, Marcia Easterling, Judy Fenwick, Richard Johnson, Kirstin Moritz, Denise Morreale, Pam Polloni, Sylvia Szulkin, Suzanne Thomas, Maro Virginia Titus, Kerry Walton.

TRANSPORTATION (Consensus (1996, revised 2021)

LWV Falmouth supports:

- Promotion of a local transportation network and acting on issues related to the Steamship Authority as they affect the Upper Cape region.
- Expansion of links between intermodal public transportation

- Focus on regional efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from all forms of transportation, including on water, on roads and in the air in accordance with efforts identified in the Cape Cod Climate Action Plan. Promote Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority (CCRTA) initiatives to increase ridership and decrease greenhouse gas emissions.
- Replacing Cape Cod Canal bridges with goals of reducing congestion, minimizing negative impact to local businesses, and increasing safety.
- Use of commuter rail service to Buzzards Bay including a Buzzards Bay passenger ferry port to the islands and Woods Hole.

LWV Falmouth Opposes:

- Parking away from limited access highways and in areas of contribution to water recharge zones
- Development of a third operational slip in Woods Hole

WATER QUALITY (Consensus 1980, 1995, updated 2021)

LWV Falmouth supports:

- Watershed protection through both outright purchase and easements in the Water Resource and Coastal Pond Overlay Districts.
- Minimum lot size of two acres 80,000 sf in watershed areas. Water Resource Overlay Districts.
- Ban on toxic septic system cleaners.
- Public education on fertilizers/pesticides/septic system cleaners related to groundwater pollution.
- All efforts to speedily and completely contain and clean up the contamination plumes emanating from the Mass. Military Reservation and from other sources.
- All efforts to protect groundwater quality and quantity, including maintenance of the natural environment and open space as a means of protecting the groundwater supply.
- Efforts to upgrade and maintain Falmouth's water supply system.
- Equitable water rates, long-range planning and public education on water issues.

LWV Falmouth opposes:

• The proposed Machine Gun Range at the Mass. Military Reservation based on its potential damage to the Upper Cape Water Supply Reserve.

Rationale for edits:

Watershed is a generic term and it seems more useful to refer to the two Overlay Districts which are defined in the Zoning Code. There is an 80,000 sf minimum lot size in the Water Resource Overlay District in the Zoning Code, which may be reduced by special permit from the ZBA.

The proposed Gun Range would be sited on the 15,000-acre Upper Cape Water Supply Reserve, an area designated by the state to serve 3 purposes: protection of the watershed, protection of wildlife habitat, and military activities compatible with those purposes. The Gun Range would destroy 170 acres of forested land that provide critical water protection and wildlife habitat services--activities that are not compatible with machine gun training activities. The Proposed Machine Gun Range involves the use of copper ammunition (potentially toxic) in the Water Supply Reserve. There is an intent to collect and recycle the copper ammunition but no public information on how that collection will be done or how effective it might be.

TOWN CHARTER (Consensus 1987; update 1989, 1990, 1991, 1998, 2007, 2013, 2018)

LWV Falmouth supports:

• The Town charter form of government as adopted on January 1, 1991 and final amendments to be voted on May 2022.

EDUCATION (Consensus 1975; updated 1983; revised 2021)

LWV Falmouth supports:

- Increased awareness of the town budget process through widespread publicity of the role of the Finance Committee and the Town Administration as well as dissemination of information about allocation of funds.
- Implementation of Educational Reform Act of 1993 and updated 2018 version of the same.
- Implementation and state funding of the "Act to Promote and Enhance Civics Education in Schools, codified as Section 2631 of the Acts of 2018.
- Increased emphasis on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion in principle and in practice.
- Alignment with LWVUS and LWVMA Education Positions, e.g. Title IX, Charter Schools, School Funding, Special Education needs, etc.

FALMOUTH TOWN BUDGET (Consensus 1983, **2021**)

LWV Falmouth supports:

- Budget which considers future needs and goals
- Town Meeting Warrants which are clear, timely and complete.

LWV Falmouth opposes:

Bonding used for local operating expenses.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING (Consensus 1986, updated 1987, revised **2021**)

LWV Falmouth supports:

- Local/county government involvement in development of affordable housing.
- Continued local government advocacy and financial support for affordable housing for all Falmouth residents with a gross income at or below the Barnstable County median income, regardless of their employment status.
- Government collaboration with the private sector, both for-profit and non-profit, in the development of affordable housing.
- Development of local/county policies and strategies that encourage young families to live in Falmouth.
- Development of local/county policies that enable Falmouth residents over age 65 to remain in their homes when the cost of doing so outpaces their financial capacity to age in place.
- Periodic updates of studies of Falmouth's housing needs commissioned by local/county government.
- Ongoing joint meetings of local government agencies, boards and committees engaged in work related to affordable housing in Falmouth.

ENVIRONMENT (Consensus 1999, updated 2000, 2021)

LWV Falmouth Supports:

- Taking action on environment issues as they affect Falmouth and the Upper Cape.
- Taking action on issues surrounding the clean-up of contaminants at the Mass. Military Reservation, groundwater protection, water conservation and air pollution, as well as changes which might increase pollution (groundwater, clear cutting and noise) at the Reservation and the Upper Cape Water Supply Reserve.
- Ongoing monitoring of environmental issues.

- Public education on the Climate Emergency.
- Efforts to increase energy efficiency, increase utilization of renewable energy sources and reduce the use of fossil fuels in the Town and Commonwealth.
- Efforts to reduce solid waste by recycling and composting.

Rationale for edits:

LWVF and LWFMA adopted the term Climate Emergency in recent years, as a more urgent term than climate change. The next to last bullet point implies our support for the Stretch Energy Code, Green Community designation, Net Zero Carbon goals, the 2016 Paris Agreement and the Next Generation Roadmap Bill.

Military Reservation would be sited on the 15,000-acre Upper Cape Water Supply Reserve, an area designated by the state to serve 3 purposes: protection of the watershed, protection of wildlife habitat, and military activities compatible with those purposes. The Gun Range would destroy 170 acres of forested land that provide critical water protection and wildlife habitat services--activities that are not compatible with machine gun training activities. The Proposed Machine

Gun Range involves the use of copper ammunition (potentially toxic) in the Water Supply Reserve. There is an intent to collect and recycle the copper ammunition but no public information on how that collection will be done or how effective it might be. The last bullet implies support for composting food waste and bans on single use plastic



LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

On March 25, the Falmouth League sent a letter signed by Joan Boyer, as Steering Committee Chair, and Judy Ziss, as Legislative Committee Chair, asking the Legislative Action Committee (LAC) of the MA League to support Common Start (HD. 960/SD.1307), a program that is intended to "establish a universal system of affordable, high-quality early education and child care for all Massachusetts families over a 5-year timeline." Later the same day, Judy was delighted to receive the following message from LAC Chair Kathy Leonardson:

You will be pleased to hear that today the LWVMA Legislative Action Committee unanimously voted to support HD.1960/SD.1307. Karen Mazza brought this bill forward for our consideration. I am gratified that the Falmouth legislative committee and Steering Committee also placed great value on this.

MACHINE GUN RANGE NEWS

Association to Preserve Cape Cod

Friends,

APCC was informed yesterday afternoon that the National Guard Bureau plans to issue a Finding of No Significant Impact for their proposed Machine Gun Range at Joint Base Cape Cod. This finding is being issued despite the concerns raised by APCC as well as overwhelming public opposition to the project revealed by APCC public records request, which forced release of the public concerns.

While the finding has not yet been released, it represented a full steam ahead approach by the Guard to force this project on Cape Cod with no regard for the requirement to protect the water supply of the Upper Cape or to the impact of the largest forest clear cut on Cape Cod in recent memory and the resultant impact on climate from the loss of mature forest cover. This project remains substantively flawed and poorly sited. While not the last step in the process, this action is a clear and unmistakable statement of intent by the Guard Bureau to proceed no matter the extent of public opposition or environmental damage that may result.

The focus will now shift to stopping this project at the state Environmental Management Commission. APCC will be providing guidance to you, our members, on how to engage with the EMC to ensure that the legitimate concerns of the public and the protection of the water supply, as required by law, are given the weight required by law.
