★ LWVMC NEW MEMBER PROFILE: ★ ELAINE GEHRMANN

Elaine Gehrmann was inspired to join our League of Women Voters chapter while attending a recent **Whites for Racial Equity** meeting and hearing **Sharon Miller** talk about the important work the League does to promote equality for all.



community and that eventually inspired me to go to law school," she adds.

Elaine has participated in many voter-related activities over the years, including **voter registration** drives, **Vote Forward** campaigns and serving as a **poll worker**. Now she adds LWVMC membership to that list.

She and her husband, **Axel**, currently serve as **co-Ministers** of the **Unitarian Universalist Church of the Monterey Peninsula**. She recalls listening to some of the speakers at our League luncheons, which were held in that church's building before the COVID-19 pandemic abruptly halted them.



Elaine earned her **law degree** at the **University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign**. Axel then took on the full ministerial duties while Elaine began a new career. *"For several years I did legal aid work at a non-profit that did civil law for people without funds and I was also an **Assistant Public Defender**," she recalls. "Then, after lawyering, I got a job as the executive director of a nonprofit organization that was an intentional community of senior citizens paired with families adopting foster children. Seniors would help support the families and vice versa. I liked that because it was more about prevention."*



Social justice has been a lifetime goal for Elaine. Born in **Pittsburgh, PA**, she earned her **BA in Anthropology and Sociology** from the **University of Pittsburgh**. Then she went on to earn her **Master of Divinity** degree from **Starr King School for the Ministry** in **Berkeley**. That's where she and Axel, who is originally from Germany, met.



Elaine says she was raised in the UU Church and recalls, *"I was always interested in people and learning about how they find and make meaning in their lives,"* which led to her subsequent career choices.



"Axel and I served as co-ministers in two different congregations before moving here," she recalls. That includes five years in **Watertown, NY**, and five more in **Champaign-Urbana, IL**. *"I was involved in a lot of social justice issues in the*



After several years with that nonprofit, Elaine decided to go back into ministry work, so she served for a year as the **UU Minister** in **Decatur, IL**. By that time, the Gehrmanns' two children, son **Noah** and daughter **Sophia**, were grown and had moved out on their own, so Elaine and Axel decided it was time for them to return to sharing one job. Consequently, in 2015, they moved to the **Monterey Peninsula** and became co-ministers at UUCMP.

In 2021, the Gehrmanns took a six-month sabbatical leave from their work, mainly journeying around the United States. During that trip, Elaine says, *"We visited over thirty civil rights museums and memorials. We did the **US Civil Rights Trail** from Selma to Montgomery, mainly driving, but walking a bit. We also visited the **Emmett Till lynching sites** and the **Equal Justice Initiative Legacy Museum**."*

Now back home, Elaine remains active with the **Monterey County ACLU**, the **NAACP**, and **Whites for Racial Equity**. She also volunteers at the **Monterey Bay Aquarium** and is a Docent at **Pt. Lobos**, and she feels enthusiastic about her new LWVMC membership.

With luck, that will soon include attending resumed League speaker lunches at UUCMP. Elaine says her fundamental goal for all the organizations to which she belongs is stressing diversity and inclusion. *The LWVMC continues to respectfully request that appropriate **Notices of Intent of Planned Use of Pesticides** be issued in a timely manner by the office of the County's Agricultural Commissioner. We made this request (see below letter) to the Agricultural Commissioner last fall, but have not received a response from that office.*

Subject: **Notice of Intent Online Prior to Use of Highly Toxic Pesticides**

The League of Women Voters of Monterey County (LWVMC) has broad policies regarding land use, health, and access to information. **In pursuit of these policies, LWVMC requests that appropriate Notices of Intent of Planned Use of Pesticides be issued in a timely manner by your office.** LWVMC understands you have the authority to issue such Notices of Intent (NOI). To date such NOIs have not been issued for public access.

LWVMC understands the following, according to the California Department of Pesticide Regulation's most recent data (<https://trackingcalifornia.org/pesticides/pesticide-mapping-tool>) and other sources:

- a. Monterey County used over 6.8 million pounds of agricultural pesticides in 2018;
- b. Of this, 2.2 million pounds (32%) were fumigants which significantly reduce the ability of farmlands to mitigate global warming because they destroy soil microbes essential to carbon drawdown;
- c. State-listed cholinesterase inhibitors can damage developing brains;
- d. State-listed neonicotinoids have negative impacts on bees and other pollinators;
- e. Also used are other highly toxic and drift-prone pesticides classified as "Restricted Material";
- f. Restricted Material pesticides are, according to the Department of Pesticide Regulation, "deemed to have a higher potential to cause harm to public health, farmworkers" and other living organisms and environments;
- g. Exposure to Restricted Material pesticides can lead to health conditions such as cancer and respiratory ailments, including asthma, that leave people vulnerable to the complications of COVID-19;
- h. Farmworkers are a vital part of California's food system and have been deemed "essential" amidst the COVID-19 pandemic;
- i. Some Restricted Materials also have the potential to harm pets, wildlife, soils and aquatic resources;

- j. Information on the application of Restricted Materials is legally required to be shared in advance with the local Agricultural Commissioner by way of Notices of Intent (NOIs);
- k. If Notices of Intent were posted online, concerned residents would have the option to know when a highly toxic pesticide was being applied nearby, providing the opportunity to take protective measures, such as shutting windows or keeping children and others at particular risk indoors; and
- l. Posting Notices of Intent online would not require any action on the part of growers, nor place any restrictions on the way in which they farm.

The LWVMC urges you to issue appropriate and timely Notices of Intent online so that schools, interested individuals, and the public can be informed. ***This would be a responsible safety measure, consistent with your duty to protect the public.*** LWVMC acknowledges the County's reputation for innovation and leadership in providing healthy food produced by a skilled and dedicated workforce, and its commitment to environmental stewardship and combating climate change. It is consistent with these policies and practices that we are in strong support of the posting of Notices of Intent online by the Monterey County Agricultural Commissioner in advance of applications.

Where the Action Is (continued)

The LWVMC will be sending the below recommendations for future redistricting to the agencies which our members monitored, in appreciation of the work they did. These recommendations will also be submitted to local media.



May 2022

The League of Women Voters of Monterey County has been observing and participating in redistricting and initial districting this last year. We commend the many people who served on commissions, submitted maps, and made their preferences known.



We would also like to commend the many jurisdictions that worked hard to run a fair, transparent, and inclusive process. These entities sought public participation, actively communicating with the public, including through clear websites; they engaged knowledgeable staff and consultants with the ability to convey complex laws and criteria-ranking requirements; and they completed the process on time. In short, they

handled a difficult balancing act well, especially considering the delays in the recent census.

The League of Women Voters of Monterey County would also like to make these recommendations to the county, cities, schools, and special districts when they redistrict after the 2030 census:

1. Strongly consider separate, independent commissions to make the decisions.
2. Select commissioners in a non-partisan manner to represent diverse communities of interest.
3. Exclude incumbency as a consideration in map-making.
4. Educate both commissions and the public on the legal framework for redistricting and the tools for map-making.
5. Minimize the number of deferred voters, i.e., those who will be unable to vote during an election cycle because of placement into a new district.
6. Provide a separate redistricting website, clearly-labeled and updated to include schedules for public input and contact information.
7. Offer hybrid (in person and virtual) meetings for maximum public participation.
8. Give public notice, including bilingual publicity, well in advance of each meeting.

★ **LWVMC'S RECOMMENDATION ON DEL REY OAKS' MEASURE B:** *Opposition to Fort Ord Regional Trail & Greenway* ★

The League of Women Voters of Monterey County recommends that Del Rey Oaks voters vote "no" on **Measure B**, which will be on the City of Del Rey Oaks' June ballot. This measure is against the **Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway (FORTAG) project** proposed through the City of Del Rey Oaks.

FORTAG will provide for alternative modes of transportation, greenways throughout the Monterey Peninsula, and significant ADA access to trails throughout the region. FORTAG was included in the transportation tax (Measure X) approved in 2016, which the League supported. ***Measure B would seriously jeopardize funding for a regional project which will benefit Del Rey Oaks as well as the wider Monterey Peninsula.***

The portion of the project within Del Rey Oaks has been significantly altered in response to concerns voiced by its residents. The initiative opposes construction of a tunnel. The latest FORTAG revision calls for a wide, lighted underpass monitored by a security camera; the narrow tunnel has been eliminated. The project will significantly increase pedestrian safety by creating an underpass across Highway 218 and provide connectivity between the two halves of the City.

LWVCA Position Supports FORTAG

Our opposition to Measure B is based on the following **League of Women Voters of California position on transportation**, which supports alternative modes of transportation that reduce

single occupant vehicles:

Transportation and land use planning should be integrated to promote reduced vehicle miles traveled through a jobs/housing balance and requirements that land use development facilitate use of transit and other alternatives to single occupant vehicles.

Planning for transportation should promote:

1. strategies to influence travel behavior, such as fees, taxes and tolls, combined with mitigation measures for low-income persons;
2. alternatives to single occupant vehicle travel, such as high occupancy vehicle lanes, expanded transit, car/van pools and bicycle lanes;
3. other strategies to improve traffic flow, such as flextime and telecommuting;
4. project evaluation processes which include early and informed public participation, analysis of alternative routes and modes, analysis of costs and benefits of each alternative, and consideration of consistency with regional and state transportation systems.


