Wednesday, November 13, 2019 Do Charter Schools Provide Real Choice?

t the November Lunch and Learn, **Dr. PK Diffenbaugh, Superintendent of the Monterey Peninsula Unified School District**, will discuss the latest on Charter Schools, their impact on local districts, and how or if they meet the needs of elementary and secondary students.

Do Charter Schools provide a real choice for parents? How is the Charter School the same or different than a private school? What are the pros and cons of Charter Schools? Does it make a difference whether the Charter School was approved by the local district or a different authority such as the County or State? Do Charter Schools have to use the same tests that public schools must use? And many more topics surrounding current issues about Charter Schools and public education.

Prior to coming to MPUSD in 2014, Dr. Diffenbaugh served as **Director of 7-12 Instruction** for **Garden Grove Unified School District**, where he oversaw all aspects of the instructional program for ten intermediate and eight high schools. He also led the turnaround of **Sacramento High School—**under his leadership the school saw increases in the **Academic Performance Index**, a state ranking, an increase in **A-G U/CSU** college eligibility, and 75 percent of graduates accepted to four-year universities.

Dr. Diffenbaugh holds a **Doctorate in Educational Leadership** from **Harvard University**, an innovative partnership between the **Harvard Business School**, **Kennedy School of Government**, and **Graduate School of Education**. He began his career as a **5th Grade Teacher** in **Oakland**.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE NOVEMBER 2019



hen it comes to talking about political issues LWV members are ready and capable. They like nothing more than engaging in a lively round of discussion with an erudite co-conversant.

In the coming holiday season we may confront few who can match those of us who nosh daily on history, current events and politics. But how do we remain patient with those who have few facts and murky science? How do we begin with those who don't follow the news? What's a good way to engage other adults, serious young adults, or a grandchild?

We don't often spark a meaningful conversation without skillful conversational follow-up ideas. Here are some ideas inspired by a conversation with **Bev Kreps**, League member and retired teacher:

First of all, because we don't want to talk down to anyone, find a suitable opening topic. It takes skill to engage each individual's interest. Think of good, focused questions to which the answer leads the direction of the discussion. As a League member you may want to talk about citizenship or history or social problems. Perhaps lead with something that a person might deal with daily, and which you

can build on together.

If for example, you wanted to discuss current issues with young people you might ask what they know about current events and issues, whether they spend classroom time on animal rights, the environment, vaccinations, or whatever happened to be in the social or political news.

With working adults you can ask their opinions on what they've heard in the news or what their friends and neighbors think. Finding a common issue takes thoughtfulness. Choose carefully to develop a high quality conversation.

The point is not to change other people's minds but to lead them to realize they have an opinion and they can make a difference. Adults have a very powerful weapon: their vote, their well-informed, carefully considered vote. They, along with others that agree with them can become a mighty force that in numbers can affect the direction our society goes.

Be an LWV warrior this coming season. Plant some seeds of hope and visions of change in the ones with whom you talk this holiday season.

The League of Women Voters of Monterey County (LWVMC) urges the CA Coastal Commission (CCC) to deny the California American Water application for a Coastal Development Permit for intake slant wells and desalination infrastructure because the Pure Water Monterey Expansion (PWM X) is a vastly superior environmental alternative water supply project.

This League of Women Voters of Monterey County (LWVMC) has studied local water issues numerous times over the last few decades. The League completed separate studies and updated its position in 1982, 1995, 2003 and 2007. *Among many positions, the League supports maximizing conservation and reclamation for all water uses.* When the first desalination plant was being considered in 2009, we led the effort to increase the use of recycled water through the **Groundwater Replenishment Program** (GWR) and to downsize the desalination plant. Since that time, replenishing the Seaside Aquifer with reclaimed water has been refined and is now a viable alternative to a costly and environmentally damaging desalination plant.

The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) approved the CPCN permit (Certificate of Public Conveyance and Necessity) for Cal Am's desalination project in late 2018. Prior to the CPUC making that decision, it approved the basic Pure Water Monterey recycling project for 3,500 acre feet of new supply. It also held evidentiary hearings on an expansion of that project to add another 2,250 acre feet of new supply. However before the CPUC finished its review of the expansion, it proceeded to approve the basic desalination project, and asked for follow up reporting on PWM Expansion.

Additional information is now available on PWM X, particularly on cost and environmental impact differences with desalination. Recent electromagnetic imaging data are also available. (continued on page 4)

By comparison with PWM X, the intake wells and desalination project shows numerous disadvantages related to environmental impacts, environmental justice, cost, and size.

- Desalination has a very large energy need, with corresponding high GHG emissions. PWN X energy need is vastly less than the desal energy need.
- Energy supply for desalination is from PGE. PWN X supply is from recovered methane gas from the local landfill.
- Desalination will discharge brine to the Marine Sanctuary. PWN X will divert existing discharge for reclamation, and reduce total discharge into the Sanctuary.
- Coastal dune disturbances are significant with desalination in contrast to PWN X which has none.
- Recent demand numbers and analysis make it clear the desalination is over-sized at 6,252 afy. PWN X is consistent with projected demand needs for 30 40 years at 2,250 afy.
- Cost differences are absolutely stunning. Desalination is estimated at \$6,000/af, while PWN X is about \$2,200/af.
- The desalination project divides the larger community by taking groundwater/brackish water from a lower income community (Marina), offering no compensating benefits to it, and delivering product water to a higher income community (Peninsula).
- The desalination project further divides the Seaside community, since it is served partly by Cal Am, and partly by Marina Coast Water District (the threatened provider to Marina and Seaside).

Slant well technology is new and experimental. It is not in operational use for desalination intakes anywhere in the world. Slant wells are novel and untested and expensive. In theory, it may be ideal. But the reality on the Monterey Peninsula is that the proposed desalination project is excessive and unnecessary.

LWVMC supports desalination as a long range water planning option, but it must be pursued only after all efforts for a low impact project are exhausted.

PWM X is the most environmentally superior project available. And it is by far the most sensible and affordable supply.

LWVMC urges the Coastal Commission to deny the Coastal Development Permit for Cal Am's proposed slant wells and desal infrastructure in the coastal zone. LWVMC further urges CCC support for Pure Water Monterey Expansion, which is located completely outside the coastal zone.

LWVMC MEMBER PROFILE: SYLVIA SHIH



Sylvia Shih has been an active member of LWVMC since 2004 and she's served as both Treasurer and Board Member at Large. She's also been a volunteer at voting precincts and a number of candidate discussions.

Born in Taiwan, Sylvia moved to the US in 1965 to earn her **Master's Degree**

in Counseling and Guidance at Stanford University. After she graduated, however, she began a career in a much different field. "I worked for IBM, where I did many things—systems programming, application programming, design and database management," Sylvia explains. First she worked for IBM in Endicott, NY, and later she moved to San Jose and worked at the company's Silicon Valley Laboratory.

Sylvia married **Charlie Turk** in 1982 and they moved to this area in 1988. She took a leave of absence from IBM in 1989, then retired in 1991, although she says she wasn't "officially" retired until 1996. "I was too young to retire, so they let me take a leave of absence. I went back to work for one hour in 1996 so I could retire officially."

Charlie died in 2007. Their family includes three daughters, a son and eight grandchildren. When we spoke, the daughter who lives in San Jose was about to visit Sylvia. "She always stops by a Chinese restaurant in San Jose and brings me a takeout," she reported.

In addition to being an active League member, Sylvia is on the **Board of the Monterey Peace and Justice Center** and she's active with **Public Water Now**. "I walked the precinct for Measure J, which passed, and we're still doing rallies and protests," she says. On November 14th, she plans to take a bus to Half Moon Bay. There, she and other activists will attend the **Coastal Commission's meeting** about **California American Water's** application to build a desalination plant near Marina.



Sylvia has a very interesting immigration story to tell. She applied for permanent residency in 1969, after she had gotten her third preference classification. "I was rejected and told I had to leave the country in 30 days," she recalls, so she called a lawyer. "He wanted \$2,000 and, back then, that was two-and-a-half months' salary!"

So Sylvia called **US Immigration Services**. "An old gentleman answered and told me I didn't have to leave, that I could get another letter in 30 days asking why I hadn't gone and then I could go to an inquiry to answer." So 30 days later, she traveled to Buffalo, NY, and had a hearing with "a judge, a prosecutor, a recording person and me," she says. "They told me I wasn't supposed to work in America. I'd filled out a card telling them that I was working and where. I told them I'd been working all along, so if I wasn't supposed to, why they hadn't they told me?" Apparently the Taiwanese Embassy was supposed to have informed her of that rule. "Every immigrant I knew was working. I said I didn't know that everybody else lied about working, so I told the truth."

Luckily, the judge listened sympathetically and appreciated both Sylvia's Stanford degree and her honesty. "So I was able to get permanent resident status without paying that lawyer a dime!" she says with a laugh. She also managed to help her roommate get permanent residency status.

When asked about the League's future, Sylvia said, "I want us to continue to hold political candidate forums. They're very important, but right now we're having trouble staffing those forums. I hope some younger people will help."

In the meantime, Sylvia, an American citizen for many years, plans to continue working hard to ensure than all American citizens maintain their crucial voting rights.
