## Program Administrator – Homeless Initiatives

- Reports directly to County Administrator
- Funded through FY 2020-2021 with Federal and State grants secured by County
- Key duties:
  - Coordinate and facilitate homeless initiatives within San Joaquin County, including the Continuum of Care program and policy directives of the Board of Supervisors.
  - Facilitate the collaborative development of strategies for prevention, diversion, emergency shelter, transitional housing, rapid re-housing, and permanent supportive housing.
  - Seek out, apply for and manage grant funding on behalf of San Joaquin County to support homeless initiatives, and convene stakeholders to facilitate the coordinated implementation of available funds County-wide.
  - Serve as a resource to community partners regarding the broad range of issues contributing to homelessness in our region.

Total: 14,350

- 7,250 male (51%)

- sudden loss of job or inadequate income
- sudden loss of home
- trauma
- physical health issues
- mental health issues
- escaping domestic violence
- substance abuse/addiction
- incarceration

## **Board Policy Statement on Homelessness**

- Adopted July 23, 2019: establishes homelessness as an operational priority for all County departments
- Seeks to address and limit the impact of homelessness by:
  - Addressing issues of health, safety and welfare associated with the homeless
  - Addressing issues of behavioral health and substance abuse
  - Outreach to the community to foster input and dialog
  - Establish metrics and data collection guidelines for County departments to accurately determine financial impacts, develop efficient and effective strategies to reduce impacts, and track positive outcomes for the homeless
- Lead departments include Sheriff, District Attorney, Community Development and Health Care Services

## **County Services**

- Provided through County Departments including:
  - Law Enforcement: Sheriff's Office, District Attorney, Public Defender, Probation, Code Enforcement,
  - Health and Welfare: Public Health Services, Environmental Health Services, Behavioral Health Services, San Joaquin General Hospital, Human Services Agency, Veteran Services, Community Development Department, Worknet,
- Services tend to be used most for our "highest needs" citizens, some but not all of whom are homeless
- High need for services can be a predictor of homelessness

## Whole Person Care

- \$18.5M over 5 year pilot
- Serves Medi-Cal beneficiaries who are chronically homeless or atrisk of homelessness, have mental health or substance use issues and/or over-utilizers of the Emergency Department
- 1,238 individuals enrolled as of July 1, 2019; 923 actively enrolled
- Stable funding for 19 recuperative care beds at Gospel Center Rescue Mission as well as 10 emergency lodging beds between Stockton Shelter and GCRM for WPC enrollees leaving incarceration

## County Support for Housing and Shelter

### Permanent Supportive Housing

- Crossway Residences: 35 units of SMI housing; \$3.5M
- Victory Gardens: 49 units of Veteran housing; \$2.4M in land and funds
- No Place Like Home: \$2.1M allocated for future SMI units
- HEAP: \$4.5M for approximately 20 "tiny houses" units

### Emergency Shelter

- New Life Women's Home: 118 bed expansion at GCRM; \$550,000
- General project support for shelter providers: \$447,298
- HEAP: planned 35 beds of emergency shelter at CMC and RTW; \$1.5M

## Encampment Response Team

- Multi-departmental team including BHS, CDD, EHS, HSA, PHS, PW, SO and CAO
- Manage and resolve homeless encampments on County property and right-of ways consistent with federal, state and local law and *Martin v*. *Boise*
- Connect unsheltered homeless with services
- Protect health and safety of unsheltered residents and general public
- Since implementation (May 2019):
  - 10 total complaints received for City, County and State-owned properties
  - 6 encampments found on County property and/or right-of ways
  - 4 mitigated, 1 multi-agency collaboration pending, 1 disbursed prior to mitigation
