'Wins' Library for West Torrance

West Torrance will soon have a public library, thanks to the efforts of Mrs. Winthrop L. Saville.

Construction has begun on the new facility, but without Mrs. Saville's determination and hard work, it may all have remained a dream.

In public acknowledgement of her success, Mrs. Saville was presented a trophy by Victor Woman's Club at that group's recent installation dinner. Mrs. Mills Spangberg made the award.

It was just over two years ago that Mrs. Saville's concern at leck of a library in the area pushed her into making inquiries. One question led to another, and soon she was sending letters to another, and soon she was sending letters to state officials and attending Library Commission meetings.

She enlisted the aid of PTAs, Girl and Boy Scouts, and all individuals who would help.

Finally, petitions were cir-culated, and in June 1960 the City of Torrance decided to build library somewhere in the West Torrance area.

Since the city had no build-ing site in mind, Mrs. Saville carried her efforts one step further. She met with realtors, and wrote to the American Library Assn. for recomendations.
The commission ultimately

selected a site on the peri-meter of Victor Park and chose to name the new library for the first librarian of Torrance, Isabel Henderson

In recognition of her interest and efforts, Mrs. Saville was appointed to the Library Commission in January 1961.
