Thursday, October 10, 6:30-7 pm (reception), 7-9 pm (program), Opening LWVW Meeting: More Voice, More Choice - The Path to Ranked Choice Voting in MA at the Wakelin Room of the Wellesley Free Library. Our speakers will be Christina Knowles and Mac D'Alessandro of Voter Choice Massachusetts. They will be discussing Ranked Choice



Voting (RCV), a voting system that allows voters to rank many candidates on a ballot in order of preference rather than choosing one candidate. With very few exceptions, all elections in Massachusetts could use RCV. Mac is a political operative who has worked on the campaigns of of late-Mayor Thomas Menino, Sen. Elizabeth Warren, Sen. Edward Markey and is a principal at Democracy Partners, a national political consultancy in which he is a principal. Christina serves as the Director of Strategic Partnerships at Voter Choice Massachusetts. Previously, Christina was the Finance Director for the "Yes on 3" statewide ballot campaign, where she led a team in raising \$6 million to secure an almost 20-point victory at the ballot on November 6, 2018 to protect transgender equal rights. 

Wellesley League Registers Record Numbers of Voters at WHS

On Tuesday, September 24, Wellesley High School students turned out in record numbers to register to vote on National Voter Registration Day, sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Wellesley. Wellesley High students' interest in exercising their right to vote has more than tripled over the last two years, from 44 in 2017 to 134 new voter registrations this year on this one-day annual event. Nationally, nearly one million citizens are expected to register to vote on the 2019 National Voter Registration Day.

For the League's volunteers, it is inspiring to witness the enthusiasm of the students of our community as they anticipate their first opportunity to vote, acknowledging voting as an important right and responsibility of citizenship.

- Defending Voting Rights: Is the Past Prologue? Opening Meeting of the Brookline League features Brookline resident Tina Cassidy, author of "Mr. President, How Long Must We Wait? - The Attorney General has certified 12 initiative petitions for ballot questions, including two Constitutional amendments which will not appear on the ballot until at least 2022. The text of the petitions can be found on the Attorney General's website. The LWVMA's positions on some of these ballot questions can be found here, including support of the petition to implement ranked choice voting in the state and the Constitutional amendment to restore the rights of incarcerated prisoners to vote.
- LWVUS has issued updated guidance to state and local Leagues recommending legislative priorities under the Making Democracy Work® Campaign. These recommendations allow for a strong unified "voice" at all levels of League across the country that aligns with the priorities of the People Powered Fair Maps Campaign.
