Women's History Month



Amelia Boynton Robinson

Amelia was an educator, voter rights activist, and helped plan and organize the "Bloody Sunday" march for voter's rights in Selma, Alabama in 1965, where she was severely beaten along with many others. She was the first Black woman and the first woman to run for Congress from Alabama. In 1990 she was awarded the Martin Luther King, Jr. Freedom Medal. She was portrayed in the Oscar nominated movie, Selma.

Born in Savannah, Georgia on August 18, 1911, she was one of ten children. Her father, was a construction worker and her mother, Anna, was a seamstress. When she wasn't working, Anna traveled to rural Black communities to promote women's suffrage. She often took 10-year-old Amelia with her as she knocked on doors and accompanied women to the polls to cast their votes.

Amelia earned a degree in home economics from Tuskegee University and in 1929, she got a job with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and traveled around Alabama promoting home canning, nutrition, and agricultural improvements. In 1930, she met Samuel William Boynton, a local USDA Extension Agent. Together, they taught rural African Americans how to improve their farming methods and home economics. They also talked about the importance of politics and education in improving their lives. They encouraged people to register to vote, and to buy land. (For full biography click <u>here.</u>)

You can volunteer several ways: Write postcards, pick up and deliver petitions and, most importantly, collect signatures. To circulate petitions, here's what you need to do:

1.) REGISTER with Citizens Not Politicians <u>HERE</u>. and also register with Citizens Not Politicians - Summit County <u>HERE</u>.

2.) COMPLETE A TRAINING. Once you register you will see the dates for the training sessions. This is a requirement the campaign is insisting everyone do. Please try to get it done soon. We will also be offering in person training soon.

3.) CONTACT OUR PETITION CAPTAINS <u>Hillary Sullivan</u> or <u>Lorann</u> <u>Murphy</u> to let them know you've completed the training.

4.) THEN SIGN UP <u>here</u> for events where you can gather signatures. To get petition books to circulate, contact Lorann.

About the Petition:

The LWV of Ohio is joining forces with other Leagues and Common Cause Ohio to obtain signatures on the Citizens Not Politicians Amendment. This amendment:

- Creates the 15-member Ohio Citizens Redistricting Commission made up of Democratic, Republican, and Independent citizens who broadly represent the different geographic areas and demographics of the state.
- Bans current or former politicians, political party officials, lobbyists, and large political donors from the Commission.
- Requires fair and impartial districts by making it unconstitutional to draw voting districts that discriminate against or favor any political party or individual politician.
- Requires the commission to operate under an open and independent process.

Our Annual Meeting is May 9th at 6:30pm at the NGE Clubhouse. At this meeting we will discuss and vote on upcoming LWVH action. A quorum of members is required for this meeting so please plan to attend.

1) LWVUS is changing the membership system. Members will pay LWVUS directly. Currently you pay your local chapter then our treasurer pays LWVUS and LWVO their portion of your dues. The new system will work in reverse with the local chapters receiving payment from LWVUS. There are a lot of questions still to be answered. We expect that this new system will allow us to change our communication platform. This will be less cumbersome for our committee but generally seamless for our members. *If you have technical, social media, or writing skills the communications committee could really use your help!*

2) LWVH is considering changing from a 501c4 to a 501c3. At the Annual Meeting you can expect to hear the pros and cons of each and then we'll vote on how to proceed and if needed, vote on the appropriate amendments to our Bylaws.
