This summer Nana may no longer be able to climb to the top of the Statue of Liberty, but she can still work to instill in her grandchild the values that the Statue and the League represent.

The first round of award decisions will be in July or August 2024. Two students will be selected based on the scholarship criteria.

The scholarship criteria are:

- · Part-time enrollment (or higher)
- · 2.0 Minimum GPA

NOTE: No other criteria is required than the standard Foundation essays on career goals and how the scholarship will help them.

In addition to the monetary award, the scholarship recipients will be given a free 1-year membership to the League of Women Voters Northwest Wayne Co. They are also expected to either attend a general membership meeting or meet with a League member in person or virtually.
