ADVOCACY

This is written on the eve of the 250th Anniversary of the American Revolution. The first battle shots were fired at Lexington and Concord on April 19, 1775. We have an opportunity to reflect on the valor, conviction and vision of the first leaders of our nation. Today, would they recognize the country they forged?

The wide range of this administration's issues under attack is staggering and alarming. The agenda discontent was so apparent in the speeches and the hundreds of signs that predominated the March 5 Iowa City Hands Off National Day of Action rally as we anticipated another rally just two weeks later.

With such an inundation of everything, it can be hard to know what advocacy and action is most

effective among the many options. Maybe the best answer is all of them as we are able.

- Participation in nationwide Days of Action rallies are a powerful reminder that we do not fight this dangerous deterioration of our democracy alone. Our voices resonate.
- Letters to the Editor can educate and inspire lowans to explore diverse opinions of the complex challenges ahead. The Advocacy Writing Kit designed by Deb Gallagher of UNI and previously shared by 100 Grannies of lowa City is an excellent resource. Ask me to share the interactive website with you.
- The LWVJC weekly Advocacy Report emailed to members showcases upcoming forums, conferences and presentations of interest to our membership.
- Contracting our elected officials is an invitation from several of our conscientious legislators who encourage questions and feedback; many have user-friendly links on their newsletter web pages for constituents to provide feedback. They hear us.
- Door-to-door conversations with our neighbors and community promote a clearer understanding of the problems we all face and the best solutions that will improve lives.
- Stay informed of news media reports of local, state and federal executive, legislative and judicial actions affecting us all.

Finally, On Thursday, April 17, the US Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit, denied the Executive Branch's motion requesting a stay pending the appeal of the accidental deportation of Abrego Garcia. The court maintained the government's role in "facilitating" his return to the US and protecting his right to due process. Within the Court's finding, this specific language should resonate with the larger moment in which we live:

"The Executive may succeed for a time in weakening the courts, but over time history will script the tragic gap between what was and all that might have been, and law in time will sign its epitaph. This case presents their unique chance to vindicate that value (the rule of law) and to summon the best that is within us while there is still time."

We have an opportunity to do better. Hopefully, we will chart a course for the future of our state that might be more recognizatble to the courageous visionaries that mapped our democracy 250 years ago.

Promote equal access to voting and ensure all votes are counted. Adopt automatic voter registration. Enact ranked choice voting. Pass a constitutional amendment allowing lowans with felony convictions to vote after time served. End electoral college.

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TRANSPARENCY & CITIZENSHIP

Demand government accountability and transparency by requiring all amendments and bills discussed in committee to be available to the public prior to a vote. Demand timely processing of Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests. Encourage direct citizen participation by continuing virtual committee and subcommittee meetings. Reinstate gender balance requirements for appointed boards and commissions.

EDUCATION

Provide oversight and track public funds being used for non-public schools. Require any non-public school receiving public funds to meet the same standards as public schools. Fully fund public schools and reinstate all AEA functions. Continue to expand access to affordable childcare and free four-year-old preschool.

REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS

Guarantee access to the full range of women's reproductive health services. Repeal the six-week abortion ban. Make contraception available without prescription and promote programs that help prevent unplanned pregnancies. Ensure Medicaid services are comprehensive and accessible. Set policies that attract maternal health professionals and address the state's OB/GYN deserts.

2025 Public Policy Priorities

HUMAN TRAFFICKING



Increase state funding for victim services; develop strategies to prevent human trafficking, domestic violence, and sexual assault; and enact "Safe Harbor" legislation to protect victims from criminal prosecution.

A ENVIRONMENT



Recognize the need for and fund water quality initiatives. Fully fund REAP. Develop state climate change strategies.

GUN SAFETY



Enact comprehensive common sense gun safety legislation. Ban assault rifles and military-grade weapons. Enact background checks on all gun sales, close gun show loopholes, require gun safety locks, repeal "stand your ground" law, and oppose legislation that allows the carrying of guns in schools.
