# **2024 Annual Meeting**

At this meeting we will discuss and vote on upcoming LWVH action. We need a quorum so please plan to attend.

- 1) LWVUS is changing the membership payment method. Starting in January, members will pay LWVUS directly. Currently you pay your local chapter then our treasurer pays LWVUS and LWVO their portion of your dues. The new system will work in reverse with the local chapters receiving payment from LWVUS. Many of the details are still being worked out by LWVUS
- 2.) LWVH is considering changing from a 501c4 to a 501c3. At the Annual Meeting you can expect to hear the pros and cons of each and then we'll vote on how to proceed and if needed, vote on the appropriate amendments to our Bylaws.

# Climate Change Comm. Presents Panelists on Best Practices for the Yard







Those who attended the Climate Change Committee's latest Roundtable meeting, "Living Sustainably: Best Practices for the Yard," learned a great deal about choosing plants and, at the same time, helping reduce the effects of climate change. The Speakers on the panel were:

- Janean Curfman, Summit Metro Parks Naturalist
- Curt Van Blarcum, Licensed Arborist, Curt's Trees
- Mike Veney, Director of Environmental Programs for Davey Tree Curt Van Blarcum (top photo) brought a variety of suggested sustainable plants to the meeting for the audience to examine. He stressed the importance of not using invasive plants and giving the trees "friends" around trees' trunks by surrounding them with smaller plants and shrubs.

Janean Curfman from Summit Metro Parks told the crowd that "a chewed leaf is a good leaf" because it shows that the insects, and particularly caterpillars, have food to eat! She also urged people *not* to rake the leaves from beds in the fall since they may contain cocoons of butterfly eggs.

Mike Veney from Davey Tree Co. talked about choosing and hiring landscapers and also shared his experience with using electric vs gas powered mowers.

Each speaker's PowerPoint slides as well as the Sustainable Yard Toolkit, which has many photos of plants and trees as well as a number of links for further information on a variety of topics, are available in the most recent Climate Change Committee newsletter. 
