Voting is currently underway in Iowa. If you requested an absentee ballot to vote by mail, you should have received your ballot. You should fill it out and get it mailed back as soon as possible to ensure it reaches the auditor's office before 8 p.m. on Election Day, or drop it at the drop box at the Auditor's office. You can track your absentee ballot here:

You can vote early in-person at the Auditor's office, at the drivethrough site at the Health and Human Services building parking ramp, or at numerous satellite voting sites through November 4. A complete list of early voting locations is here:

VOTER REGISTRATION

Early voter registration ended October 19. The LWVJC began registering voters June 7 and 8 at Summer of the Arts, on the Ped Mall and ended October 19 at the Corridor Community Action Network (CCAN) Engagement Fall Festival, also on the Ped Mall.

Overall, we held 34 registration events including 3 public Libraries (part of National Voter Registration Day), the Naturalization Ceremony, 5 high schools /colleges, 3 community pantries, 6 senior living residences, and 16 different community events. In addition, 4 individual members registered voters at other venues. The work was done by 49 different volunteers, who gave up hours of their time to make voter registration and obtaining absentee ballots easy for Johnson County residents.

Our efforts paid off as we registered 441 people and completed 95 Requests for Absentee Ballots, Of the 441 registrations, 215 were from the high schools and colleges, with 94 registrations coming from Liberty, City and West High Schools, 58 from U of I, College of Nursing and 59 from Kirkwood Community College.

Other registration counts include:28 from the libraries and the naturalization ceremony; 43 from Senior Living; 39 from the Food Pantries;

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94 from the community events; and 22 from individual members. Not included in the count, Liberty High students independently registered at least 60 additional students, over half of whom will be 18 on election day. Most (73) of the Requests for Absentee Ballots were from Senior Living.


The statistics tell only part of the story. We answered questions, including who was running for president, checked registration status, obtained Personal Identification Numbers (PIN), from the auditor's office for people who didn't have a valid driver's license or non-operator ID, gave out QR codes for online voter registration, and provided a variety of educational material about early voting and voter Identification requirements.

On a personal note, the experience of setting up and working the events cannot be quantified. We were welcomed and appreciated by all organizations and people they serve. The value residents of senior living placed on voting was heartwarming. One 96 year old woman thanked us for helping her get an absentee ballot and PIN because her driver's license expired 3 months previously and she didn't know if she could get to the polls. Another person had voted in every election since Dewey -Truman and had to re-register because he just moved.

Faculty and staff at the colleges and High Schools were supportive, reminding students to register during their breaks. We were invited into one classroom to talk about the importance of the youth vote. It was fun seeing the college students excited about voting and wanting to switch their registration from their hometown to lowa City.

Finally, I was truly surprised by how many of the people we approached were already registered. Can't wait to see how the voter turnout goes in Johnson County.

VOTER SERVICES

There are four contested state races in the 2024 November election involving Johnson County residents. They are State Senate District 46, State Representative District 86, State Representative District 91, and State Representative District 92.

A candidate forum combining the State Senate District 46 contest and the Representative Districts 91 and 92 was held on Monday, October 7 at the Kalona Historical Village in Kalona, Iowa. All candidates were invited to participate. Ed Chabal, candidate for Senate District 46, Anna Banowsky, candidate for House District 91 and Jay Gorsch, candidate for House District 92 attended. The three other candidates did not accept or decline the invitation. Approximately 25 people attended the in-person event. A recording of the event is available on the League website and the league's Facebook page.

The first day of early voting was October 16 and the General Election is on Tuesday, November 5, 2024. Please make your plan to vote.

Thoughts on the Importance of Voter Education

As I sit down to write what is supposed to be a committee report, my thoughts are stuck on Sam Freedman's recent book, 'Into the Bright Sunshine: Young Hubert Humphrey and the Fight for Civil Rights', which I've been reading preparatory to his speaking at the LWVJCsponsored public lecture on October 24 (now past). Today, the term "civil rights" tends to be associated with past-tense politics, eclipsed many times over as the post-World War II movement for Black civil rights spawned a succession of movements for the rights of other Americans, beginning with those of women on up to the most recent for trans-gender youth. As a case in point, the 60th anniversary of the 1964 Civil Rights Act—one of the most significant federal laws enacted in the 20th century, signed by President Lyndon Johnson on July 2, 1964 came and went with little fanfare.

Yet, as I read Freedman's compelling account of politics in Minneapolis, Minnesota, where Hubert Humphrey got his start by winning the mayoral race in 1945, what strikes me is how littlechanged are the beliefs, rhetoric, and tactics of aggrieved nationalists and white supremacists who perceive that "their" rights are somehow being infringed as America struggles to fulfill the promise of being a society that upholds the principle of equality. To win the mayor's office, Humphrey had to surmount the Silver Legion, an anti-Semitic, pro-fascist organization much like the better-known German American Bund which found a toehold among white protestants in Minneapolis. He also had to confront entrenched northern bigotry at a time when the pervasive injustices of racism at home were being blatantly exposed by a double standard in the American military during World War II: more than one million African American servicemen and servicewomen helped win the war against Hitler's brutal Nazi regime as they endured the same old patterns of segregation and racial

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discrimination in all branches of the armed forces. As a testament to his own political savvy, not only to win the 1945 election but set Minnesota on a new political course, Humphrey helped effect the 1944 merger of the state's Democratic and Farmer-Labor parties to create a left-leaning alliance, the DFL or Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party, which endures to this day.

All this reminds me, once again, of how vital education is in cultivating informed voters to hold at bay those forces that would undermine hardwon civil rights and circumscribe representational democracy. But this is preaching to the LWVJC choir. The Education Committee report next month will have information about two programs on immigration issues in Johnson County which are in the planning stage.



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LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS* OF IOWA 2025 Public Policy Priorities

★ VOTING

Promote equal access to voting and ensure all votes are counted. Adopt automatic voter registration. Enact ranked choice voting. Pass a constitutional amendment allowing lowans with felony convictions to vote after time served. End electoral college.

★ TRANSPARENCY & CITIZENSHIP

Demand government accountability and transparency by requiring all amendments and bills discussed in committee to be available to the public prior to a vote. Demand timely processing of Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests. Encourage direct citizen participation by continuing virtual committee and subcommittee meetings. Reinstate gender balance requirements for appointed boards and commissions.

器EDUCATION

Provide oversight and track public funds being used for non-public schools. Require any non-public school receiving public funds to meet the same standards as public schools. Fully fund public schools and reinstate all AEA functions. Continue to expand access to affordable childcare and free four-year-old preschool.

REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS

Guarantee access to the full range of women's reproductive health services. Repeal the six-week abortion ban. Make contraception available without prescription and promote programs that help prevent unplanned pregnancies. Ensure Medicaid services are comprehensive and accessible. Set policies that attract maternal health professionals and address the state's OB/GYN deserts.

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(III) HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Increase state funding for victim services; develop strategies to prevent human trafficking, domestic violence, and sexual assault; and enact "Safe Harbor" legislation to protect victims from criminal prosecution.

& ENVIRONMENT

Recognize the need for and fund water quality initiatives. Fully fund REAP. Develop state climate change strategies.

GUN SAFETY

Enact comprehensive common sense gun safety legislation. Ban assault rifles and military-grade weapons. Enact background checks on all gun sales, close gun show loopholes, require gun safety locks, repeal "stand your ground" law, and oppose legislation that allows the carrying of guns in schools.
