Letter From the President

Hello LWV Hudson!

Want to make you all aware that LWV Ohio (and therefore LWV Hudson) is joining forces with Citizens Not Politicians, Fair Districts, Common Cause Ohio, and other allies to gather signatures to end gerrymandering in Ohio.

The goal is to have enough signatures by June 2024 to have this amendment added to the ballot in November 2024.



The Citizens Not Politicians amendment would create a citizen led redistricting commission comprised of 5 Democrats, 5 Republicans, and 5 Independent Ohio citizens representing all geographic and demographic areas of our state. Current and former politicians would be banned from the commission. It would disallow discrimination or favor for any political party or individual politician. The commission would be required to operate under an open and independent process.

Petition drives provide volunteer opportunities for everyone! Thank you to Hillary Sullivan and Lorann Murphy, who volunteered to be Petition Captains. They can answer questions and are encouraging all to volunteer. First step is to get yourself registered and educated! See below for instructions.

Fair elections are the cornerstone of democracy!

It's time to end Gerrymandering in Ohio

The League of Women Voters of Ohio is joining forces with Common Cause Ohio to obtain signatures on the Citizens Not Politicians Amendment. Signature books are available and we hope to collect some during December at events around Hudson. Signature collection will continue through at least May. This amendment:

- Creates the 15-member Ohio Citizens Redistricting Commission made up of Democratic, Republican, and Independent citizens who broadly represent the different geographic areas and demographics of the state.
- Ban current or former politicians, political party officials, lobbyists, and large political donors from the Commission.
- Require fair and impartial districts by making it unconstitutional to draw voting districts that discriminate against or favor any political party or individual politician.
- Require the commission to operate under an open and independent process.

To be a volunteer to collect signatures, here's what you need to do:

1.) REGISTER with Citizens Not Politicians <u>HERE</u>. and also register with Citizens Not Politicians - Summit County <u>HERE</u>.


2.) COMPLETE A TRAINING. Once you register you will see the dates for the training sessions. This is a requirement the campaign is

How Democracies Die by Steve Levitsky & Daniel Ziblatt

Is our democracy in danger? Harvard professors Steven Levitsky and Daniel Ziblatt have spent more than 20 years studying the breakdown of democracies in Europe and Latin America, and they believe the answer is yes. Democracy no longer ends with a bang--in a revolution or military coup--but with a whimper: the slow, steady weakening of critical institutions, such as the judiciary and the press, and the erosion of longstanding political norms. The good news is that there are several exit ramps on the road to authoritarianism.

Levitsky and Ziblatt show how democracies die--and how ours can be saved. <u>RSVP</u> please.

Thank Sarah for Thanksgiving

If it weren't for poet, novelist and essayist, Sarah Josepha Hale, we might not have a National Day of Thanksgiving. We all know that President Lincoln declared Thanksgiving a holiday--but he was not the first. George Washington in 1789 first proclaimed Oct. 3rd a special day of thanksgiving and gratitude and it was celebrated on various dates, only in some states, and mostly in the northeast.



Enter Sarah Hale who tirelessly promoted Thanksgiving's permanent place on the American calendar. She devoted a chapter of her novel, *Northwood: A Tale of New England*, describing in rich detail a classic Yankee Thanksgiving that a visitor from England celebrates with a family in New Hampshire. Critics say it's the finest account in American literature of the mood, spirit, and emotion that generations of Americans have about the holiday. "You can almost smell the roast turkey at its "lordly station" at the head of the table," said one writer.

In 1837, Hale became Editor of *Godey's Lady Book*, where she remained for more than 40 years, growing circulation to more than 150,000 by 1861 and turning it into one of the most influential periodicals in the country. While at *Godey's*, Hale often wrote editorials and articles about the Thanksgiving holiday. She believed that a national celebration would bring together families and communities. "There is a deep moral influence in these periodical seasons of rejoicing in which a whole community participates," she wrote.

Beginning in 1846, when James Polk was president, Sarah requested that he and other leading politicians declare a national celebration of Thanksgiving. Sarah lobbied state and federal officials for 17 years to pass legislation creating a fixed, national day of thanks on the last Thursday of November. Her requests were largely ignored by presidents and politicians. But, by 1854, more than 30 states and U.S. territories had a Thanksgiving celebration on the books, but Hale's vision of a national holiday remained unfulfilled. She also believed that a national holiday could help ease growing tensions and divisions between the northern and southern parts of the country.

Then in 1863 President Lincoln, who seemed to have a similar ability to find hope and reason to be grateful, even in the middle of the civil war, signed into action "A National Day of Thanksgiving and Praise."

Let's remember Sarah Josepha Hale and her determination and perseverance.
