This position has been applied to support Measure O, which will continue the sales tax that has been used to support our police and fire departments, repair our roads and help children who have been victims of crime. MEASURE O SUPPORT

Four years ago, Humboldt County voters decided they were tired of having too few deputies on patrol; inadequate rural fire protection; and crumbling roads. Sacramento kept cutting state funding for these vital services, and so our local citizens passed Measure Z, a one-half cent sales tax. The funds from this sales tax were specificially to be used for maintaining and enhancing public safety and essential services.

With these funds, the county was able to add new deputies in the rural areas of Humboldt, keep the McKinleyville station manned 24/7, increase the number of probation officers, beef up the District Attorney's office; support volunteer fire departments with additional resources and training; provide better support services for children who had been the victims of crime; and repair many miles of decaying roads.

Measure Z is due to sunset on March 31, 2020. In order to keep this very small tax in place, voters need to pass its replacement, Measure O. This will provide Humboldt with a guaranteed source of local funding that cannot be taken by the state. It will not raise the sales tax rates again, but will maintain the current level passed by voters in 2014. The Humboldt County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to place Measure O on the November 6, 2018 ballot.

If the measure does not pass, we could go back to the bad old days, when southern Humboldt had no deputies at night, and only two or three deputies covered all of northern and eastern Humboldt.

The League of Women Voters of Humboldt County supports adequate local government financing to maintain government services to meet the demands of the community.

Please Vote "Yes" on Measure O.

Humboldt County Elections Transparency Project

The Elections Transparency Project (ETP) is a routine event held during the canvas period following election day. It has been conducted for the last ten years and is unique to our county. The ETP is a volunteer effort to independently scan all ballots cast in Humboldt County elections. Using a high speed scanner, each ballot is digitally scanned into a database allowing for checks and balances in our election system. The scans are then made available to any interested party. In this way, people can have access to ballot images generated by an independent group, even though they cannot have access to the actual paper ballots that have been cast. The advantage of the ETP approach is that it supplements the black box of election tabulating equipment with a more transparent independent scan. Over the years this process has discovered flaws that were corrected, most recently in the June 2018 election. Votes in a certain precinct were miscounted and although it did not change the outcome, it demonstrates the need for accuracy in elections and how the ETP supports that.

This project is entirely run by volunteers and more are needed to help during weekdays and weekends starting mid-November. If you're interested in volunteering or have questions, contact Kevin Collins at 498-2740 or by email at <u>k-bcollins@msn.com</u>

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A Voice for the Voiceless

There are now more children in the Humboldt County Child Welfare System due to abuse and neglect, than there have ever been before. In February of this year, the State Attorney General was forced to intervene in the Humboldt County Child Welfare Department and mandated them to come into compliance to stop their violations of the Child Abuse Neglect & Recording Act. There were several violations, one of which was that Humboldt County was filing child abuse cases at a significantly lower rate than the rest of California Counties. They were also not performing investigations of abuse reports in a timely manner.

Since this mandate went into effect, Humboldt County Child Welfare has had to follow up on child abuse reports they had previously disregarded, resulting in a huge influx of new kids being brought into foster care. In the months since February, the number of children in foster care in Humboldt County has continued to grow and now there are more children in the system than there have ever been before.

Again, intervention from outside of our County was needed for Humboldt County Child Welfare to do their job of protecting children.

It is no wonder that Humboldt County leads the state in childhood trauma indicators and also leads the state in the number of children in foster care by percentage of population. In addition to all of the hurdles foster children face, they also encounter the highest number of challenges to completing high school and going on to college.

When you become a member of the CASA community you change the future for foster children one child at a time, helping them make their dreams a reality. **Children with a CASA advocate:**

do better in school,

get more services to counteract their childhood trauma,

get a stable, consistent advocate who becomes a resilience multiplier in their lives,

benefit by receiving corrective experiences from their CASA, and

grow up healthy and happy, reversing generational patterns.
