# NEWS FROM STATE AND NATIONAL by Carol Walton

The LWVPA website provides some information on the push for new voting systems in Pennsylvania. In August, Pitt Cyber (Institute for Cyber Law, Policy and Security at the University of Pittsburgh) and Citizens for Better Elections released an analysis of Pennsylvania's new voting systems. The report shows that Ballot Marking Devices are nearly twice as expensive as Hand Marked Paper Ballots.



The Blue Ribbon Commission on Pennsylvania's Election Security (in which LWVPA participated) made a number of recommendations: Pennsylvania's vulnerable voting machines should be replaced with votermarked paper ballots; the Pennsylvania General Assembly and federal government should provide funding for new machines; and cybersecurity assessments, awareness and training should be implemented.

LWVPA strongly encourages counties to purchase Hand Marked Paper Ballot systems – they are the most secure systems available. [Editor's note: Voting machines are being selected in Allegheny County the day that this VOTER is being produced – September 25 at 5 p.m. LWVGP has submitted testimony favoring the Hart Intercivic machines that we believe best fulfill the requirements for voter-marked ballots and ADA-compliant ballots. We should know the result soon.]

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
The League is a nonpartisan organization whose purpose is to encourage the informed participation of citizens in government and to influence public policy through education and advocacy.

LWVUS urges you to contact your US Senators (Casey and Toomey) in support of the "For the People Act." This is the companion legislation to HR1 which was introduced in the House of Representatives at the beginning of 2018. This legislation would make it easier to vote by improving access, removing barriers and modernizing the system; promote integrity by restoring the Voting Rights Act, prohibiting voter role purges and ending partisan gerrymandering; and bolstering election security. It would end the dominance of big money in politics through stricter disclosure rules, by empowering citizens (as opposed to corporations), and strengthening oversight by the Federal Election Commission. It would also ensure that public officials work for the public interest by strengthening ethics laws, slowing the revolving door and imposing greater ethics enforcement.

Both LWVUS and LWVPA are gearing up to focus on the 2020 Census which will "shape our nation's government, public policy and budgets for an entire decade." The important data collected will be used to make decisions about education, healthcare, infrastructure, and political representation. The Census is constitutionally required to count every person living in the United States. Adequate funding and person power is essential to getting a complete count; tell your legislators we must fully fund the Census and make sure everyone is counted.



# GREAT ISSUES: TWO PERSPECTIVES ON IMMIGRATION

Please join us for the first panel discussion in our 2019-2020 Great Issues series. The dialogue will take place from 7-8:30pm in the Redeemer parish hall, Thursday, October 3. We are excited to welcome two panelists to discuss the causes and the economic impact of immigration.

Brian Kovak is an Associate Professor of Economics and Public Policy at Carnegie Mellon University's Heinz College. He received a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Michigan in 2010 and his research focuses on the labor market impacts of international trade, migration, and technological change. His research has been reported in media outlets ranging from the Atlantic and Slate to the Financial Times and the Wall Street Journal.

Javier Vazquez D'Elia has a degree in International Studies from ORT University of Uruguay, and a doctorate in Political Science from the University of Pittsburgh. He is currently a professor and researcher at the Pitt Center for Latin American Studies. He specializes in the comparative political economy of social policy reform, democratization, and problems of democratic governance.
