Polling Place Accessibility for Disabled Voters A Report

September 11-15, 2023 was declared Disability Voting Rights Week in many

communities. Paula Bowman sent information to those of us in the League's Communication Network about several webinars offered by **Detroit Disability Power** to discuss voting place accessibility, or lack of it. I "attended" two, one informative about the study, the other a training workshop from which I gleaned lots of resources to help our DEI Committee as we begin our examination of local courthouses.

The first hour of one 3-part webinar featured Dessa Cosma, founder of Detroit Disability Power, and Kenia Flores speaking about their 2022 Report of their audit of polling place accessibility, *Voting Accessibility for Detroit Voters with Disabilities.* The full report is available at

https://www.detroitdisabilitypower.org/pollaudit. They audited 261 sites in and around Metro Detroit on Election Day, November 8, 2022. With support from the Carter Center to develop a very thorough process, they found only 16% that passed all four of the requirements completely. Categories include accessible parking with clear, level pathways into the building, accessible entries, fully accessible Voter Assist Terminals plugged in and turned on and at the right height for wheelchairs and an accessible booth to cast paper ballots privately. Many problems could be remedied readily, such as moving trash cans holding a door open. But these fixes need awareness and intentionality. Clerks need to be sure to train their workers. The report has been shared with the appropriate State offices.

Although the Americans with Disabilities Act, Voting Rights Act, and the Help America Vote Act set some requirements, still a gap of 1.5% exists. Yes, absentee ballot availability has certainly helped, but there are problems with those also such as dropbox availability. "Some of us like to vote in person so as to be a part of the process; it should be available," said Dessa. Discovering that this is the way things are at polling places, the issues provoke wider implications. We have some work to do.
