# Start to Finish: How Your Ballot is Made and Counted

September 18, 2019 Speaker: Eric Corbin, Deputy Director, Butler County Board of Elections 7:30pm The Knolls of Oxford, Commons Auditorium, 6727 Fairfield Road, Oxford, OH

The League of Women Voters is currently focusing on "Empowering Voters. Defending Democracy." The right to vote is a fundamental principle of our democracy. When more Americans can participate in our elections, the outcome better reflects who we are as a country. But voting is a local action, we vote in a precinct, at a polling place that is run by our county's Board of Elections. Therefore, the first meeting of the Oxford League of Women Voter this year will feature Eric Corbin, Deputy Director of the Butler County Board of Elections. Mr. Corbin will be detailing the work of the Board, explaining how the Board fulfills its duties to ensure voter access in an election system that is "free, fair, open and honest." Among its commitments to the residents of Butler County, the Board of Elections is charged with "maintaining an accurate list of citizens who are qualified to vote" and "using equipment that reliably clarifies and registers the voter's choice."

This meeting will focus on the beginning of the process where candidates pull and file petitions, and then Mr. Corbin will talk about programming, proofing the machines, finally discuss how ballots are counted. In addition, he will demonstrate the new voting system that will be used for the first time this November.



# "Suffragettes: With Liberty and Voting for All"

On Wednesday, Sept 25th, the Children's Theatre of Cincinnati will present "Suffragettes: With Liberty and Voting for All" at the Oxford Community Arts Center. This free performance is for kids of all ages and adults too! The performance will run from 7 to 8 pm. # **Oxford 2020 Census Committee**

Our league has been involved in the 2020 census effort since our public program last January when Rose Simmons, U.S. Census Bureau, presented the history of the census and the changes for 2020, as well as the significant importance of an accurate count. At that time, she recommended that Oxford form a Complete Count Committee (CCC) so that all entities in the Oxford area could work towards ensuring that every person is counted.

With the City of Oxford taking the lead, the committee has met several times; in August, we received the necessary training to be an official CCC committee. LWV Oxford is in good company; also joining the effort are NAACP, Community Resource Center, Talawanda Oxford Pantry & Social Services (TOPSS), Miami University, Oxford Senior Center, Three Valley Conservation Trust and others as they are invited to join. The group will make every effort to encourage the public to respond to the census in April 2020. You'll see lots of information from various groups over the coming months.

The census count will be used to create Ohio's new Congressional and Statehouse legislative maps and to distribute \$33 billion within the state annually. With the "citizenship question" issue behind us, thanks to the Supreme Court decision that it is not relevant to the purpose stated, the hope is that an accurate count of those who live in this country can be accomplished.

# **Membership Update**

Soon (2020) we will be celebrating the one hundred anniversary of the 19th Amendment granting women the right to vote. The act didn't cover everyone so the work continued for many years as it continues yet today. For example, the majority of African American women didn't really get to vote until the 1965 Voters Right Act that prohibited racial discrimination in voting. People of Color were subjected to Jim Crow rules, 'literacy' tests (i.e., How many bubbles in a bar of soap? , Reciting a state's Constitution...) and other forms of suppression. Native Americans born in the U.S. weren't granted citizenship until June 2, 1924, Yet even after the Indian Citizenship Act, some Native Americans weren't allowed to vote because the right to vote was governed by state law. As late as 1957, some states barred Native Americans from voting!

The Oxford LWV has a strong history and many living legends among us. Local women and men have been working tirelessly to MAKE DEMOCRACY WORK.


