**Welcome**: Maren Potter, MHS senior, was introduced as new Student Representative; Maren was interviewed by Select Board and will be sworn in as new rep; she is Team Harmony student president, has worked on the flag policy and spoken in front of the School Committee, (flag policy is on hold presently); and participates in Cross Country and Track; Members introduced themselves to Maren

**Update on Marblehead Police Dept. News**: Chief King was absent due to family illness, but left report that the swastika at Seaside is being investigated; he and other members of the Marblehead Police Department were present at the capacity gathering at Temple Sinai to commemorate the October 7 first anniversary of the attack on Israel; Chief King also spoke at Swampscott High School, sponsored by the ADL, about area incidents

**Update on Indigenous People's Day**: Celebration in partnership with Marblehead Museum scheduled for Monday, October 14 beginning at 11:00 am inside at Abbot Hall Auditorium; Diane will read acknowledge statement; Native American storyteller, jewelry and crafts
