## Make a Difference This Election

The 2022 mid-term elections are almost here and our League is front and center in the work to get voters registered, provide information about candidates through VOTE411, explain the ballot issues, and assure that all voters understand the who, what, where, why and when about the election. Our job is to eng make sure voters have the tools still they need to make democracy work.

First up: What's on the ballot? In Otsego County voters will elect a U.S. senator, member of the House of Representatives, governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, state assembly person and state senator, as well as county sheriff and some local town officers. Also on the ballot is the Environmental Bond Act of 2022 (read more inside), a \$3 billion environmental bond issue.

How can you make a difference this election? Join us as we work to register voters and distribute information at three events (and more may be coming). The tasks are simple—help people register,

### LWV Oneonta Receives Grant and Takes GOTV Plans to Campus

The League of Women Voters of the Oneonta Area recently received a mini grant from the New York State League of Women Voters for a Get Out The Vote (GOTV) project on the campus of Hartwick College. The League hopes to provide voter registration information and voter registration applications to as many Hartwick College students as possible.

Additionally, Oneonta League member Zach McKenney will be working with his Qualitative Analysis class in the Fall semester to conduct a qualitative mixed method research study to ascertain the barriers and bridges to college student participation in the electoral process. Zach and his students are distributing a qualitative survey designed to ascertain Hartwick students' current level of engagement in the electoral process, their current level of satisfaction or dissatisfaction with the electoral process, and identify the barriers and bridges that would lead to increased civic participation. They will also conduct a series of focus groups on campus to supplement the findings from the qualitative survey and provide a more holistic picture of paths to increasing civic engagement among college students.

Membership in the LWV Oneonta Area is free for students. This GOTV project should help the League not only increase membership in the Oneonta area, but also provide a path to long-lasting political engagement among college students.

## Food Waste Composting Pilot Held in Cooperstown

Earlier this past summer, Madeleine Zenir, a new League member, undertook a composting pilot project in the Village of Cooperstown. Twenty-five participants saved the food waste from their homes, happily depositing it in a bucket, which Madeleine would collect once a week. The buckets of all those corn cobs, watermelon rinds, chicken bones, tomato skins, peach pits, shrimp shells, and forgotten leftovers from the back of the fridge-more than 2,500 pounds-ended up in Madeliene's compost pile. That's 2,500 pounds of stuff that was diverted from the landfill. That's 2,500 pounds of food waste that at this very moment is being transformed into high-quality compost for use in gardens.

The summer program was just the start. Madeleine has long-term plans for her business, Cooperstown Composting.

"This pilot program," Madeleine notes, "has helped me collect data and learn more about composting on a larger scale. In the coming months, I hope to expand the program and collect from more residents as well as restaurants and small businesses."

Among the plans are organizing a free drop-off location in town for those who do not wish to have their compost picked up curbside. Stay tuned for more updates from Cooperstown Composting!

## Vote Yes for the Bond Act

The League of Women Voters of New York is supporting the Environmental Bond Act of 2022, also known as "Clean Water, Clean Air and Green Jobs Bill" and has joined the "Vote YES Clean Water and Jobs" coalition.

The bond, if passed, will provide funds for a variety of environmental projects:

- Restoration and flood risk reduction (\$1.1 billion)
- Open space land conservation and recreation (\$650 million).
- Climate change mitigation (\$1.5 billion).
- Water quality improvement and resilient infrastructure (\$650 million).

These funds would support projects like lessening agricultural nutrient pollution, flood mitigation, harmful algal bloom abatement, sewer line replacements for failing septics or cesspools, climate change



Legislation passed in April will require all new school buses in the state to have zero emissions by 2027 and by 2035 all buses must be zero emission. If passed, the bond calls for \$500 million in funding for

zero-emissions school buses and includes

provisions to address environmental justice.
