HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE LWV TEXAS CONVENTION

Kerrville, TX, April 27-29, 2018

- LWVD was represented by six delegates: Susybelle Gosslee, Julie Lowenberg, Cecilia McKay, Eileen Rosenblum, Diane Tasian, and Linda Wassenich. In addition, two members from Dallas serve on the State Board. Elaine Wiant is President and Miriam Foshay is Treasurer.
- Members from LWVD who were elected to the state board for 2018-2020 are Eileen Rosenblum as a Vice President and Miriam Foshay as Treasurer.
- Delegates voted to review and update two positions: Criminal Justice and Capital Punishment and Land Use.
- Membership has increased statewide by 18%.
- The LWV Texas VOTER has been replaced by the monthly Action News, which is totally online.
- The state board voted to create a new 501(c)(3) organization which will replace the LWV-TEF. At convention, delegates voted to move the functions and most of the assets of LWVTX to this new corporation, which is temporarily being called Lone Star League of Women Voters (LSLWV). This conversion will be complete upon receipt of the approved paperwork from the IRS.
- The state PMP for students has been eliminated, following the lead of LWVUS.
- Linda Wassenich was honored with the President's Award, given by Elaine Wiant, for her 48 years of membership in the League, including 29 years serving on the Dallas, Texas, or national board. Her 13 years on the state board stands as the longest tenure for any state board member.
- Randall Buck Wood received the Defending Democracy Award at the banquet on Saturday night for his work in defending voting rights and equalizing funding for public schools in Texas.

ADVOCACY STATEMENT

presented at the May 9, 2018, City of Dallas City Council meeting by Diane Tasian, LWVD Program VP.

My name is Diane Tasian, my address is ---. I am here as a member of, and on behalf of, the League of Women Voters of Dallas.

The League of Women Voters of Dallas supports fair, affordable housing for all who need it, supplied throughout the region by the combined efforts of all government entities and the private sector. We have held this position for decades; and, in 1996, added a focus on affordable housing and increased accountability for public funds.

Please note that when I use the term "affordable housing" it isn't just housing for people of median income. The League's position clearly says "affordable housing for all who need it" which includes the

continuum of affordable housing for households of median-income, through low-income, to the homeless.

Housing is a complex issue fraught with emotion; and, in Dallas, it has been the focus of significant litigation. We have inherited the effects of bad planning (often with federal funding attached) which, combined with our history of racism, has given us a divided city with stark differences between "the Haves" and "the Have Nots".

We applaud the City for focusing on the housing crisis; for facing the reality that the solutions are our responsibility; and look forward to additional developments as new data is available, such as the Regional Housing Assessment being conducted at UTA.

We thank you for conducting the

housing policy process with transparency and accountability. These are principles upon which the League places a high priority.

We recommend you support this policy which embraces Fair Housing and encourages home ownership and will build a more workable relationship with landlords. We urge you to support the staff in further development of policies that reinvigorate neighborhoods at risk of further decline and go further to protect the owners and tenants in those areas at risk of the negative effects of reinvestment. These are the very people who have persevered against incredible odds to hold their communities together.

We stand beside you, applaud you for being open to solutions, and hope we can help.

ANNOUNCEMENT! STUDENT-DRIVEN VOTER REGISTRATION & TURNOUT

In August 2018 Dallas County Community Colleges and the League of Women Voters of Dallas are introducing a new friend, Inspire US. Inspire US is a non-profit, non-partisan organization that supports **Student-Driven Voter Registration and Turnout in high schools across the country**. In the last three years they have helped more than 48,000 high school students from 321 schools in nine states register to vote with students in those states voting at a higher rate than the statewide average of their peers.

Inspire is expanding to the Dallas area and has funding to support 25-30 school campuses in 2018-19. Our goal is to help make this as easy as possible for schools, and we will also provide district- and school-level voter registration and voter turnout reports to share impact.

Inspire US will be up and running on all DCCCD campuses by spring 2019. As part of the Inspire US rollout, the League will be working alongside them beginning in August 2018.

LWV DALLAS GEARING UP FOR NOVEMBER VOTERS GUIDE: VOLUNTEERS NEEDED



November will be upon us before we know it. Your league has already begun planning to produce a Voters Guide for this key election. Once again the League will cover every race on the ballot, from Senator and Governor down to Constable and JP. If it's on the ballot, it's in the LWV Voters Guide.

The guide requires significant work behind the scenes and Vote411 coordinator, Dorie Cranshaw, is looking for volunteers to help with the effort. LWV Dallas needs 8-10 volunteer candidate "Wranglers". Each wrangler will be assigned a small group of candidates to contact (we provide phone numbers and emails) and urge their participation in the Voters Guide. The job requires about a 4-6 hour time commitment spread over 3 weeks in September.

This is something you can definitely do from home during the day or evening as your schedule permits.

Through dogged determination and persistence, LWV can boast a 76% candidate response rate for the legislative and judicial races this spring. We hope to do at least as well for the fall election. The product of the group's hard work will be available on the www.Vote411.org website which provides a personal ballot for each voter and will be available in early October.

LONG-TIME MEMBER "GENIE FRITZ"

This year Genie Fritz celebrates 66 years with the League of Women Voters of Dallas! Genie was introduced to the League by a friend who encouraged her to become a member in 1952.

Genie moved to Dallas in 1945. Prior to that, her father's job assignments brought her to Argentina, Guatemala and many other places overseas, where they lived. Back in the U.S.A. Genie attended the University of Texas where she met her husband Ned, they had been married 64 years when he passed away in 2008.

She became a resource person for the League and was chosen to travel throughout the country to learn about poverty programs. Genie was selected for her experience in poverty issues and also because she spoke Spanish, a Legacy from her Mexican grandmother. Genie also participated in the Overseas Education Fund established in 1947 by the League of Women Voters to help women organize in order to solve their problems and overcome barriers to their full participation in the social, political, and economic lives of their societies.

Genie served as President of the LWV Dallas and was also on the Board of LWV Texas serving as a resource person in Poverty Programs and School Finance. The LWV Dallas awarded her the Virginia Macdonald Leadership Award in 1999. She credits the League with her personal and professional development.

Genie was president of the Women's Southwest Federal Credit Union, president of the Greater Dallas Housing Opportunity and was involved with the Girl Scouts.

She has been recognized for her decades of work in Texas conservation and environmental concerns. She shared the North Texas Master Naturalist Dragonfly Award with her late husband Ned Fritz. Genie and Ned created many of the agencies that ensure preservation and

environmentally sound treatment of many of the great parks in Texas. She still maintains that hers was a "supporting role" but those who worked with her sav



Genie was the force behind their conservation efforts.

During her stellar career as a conservationist and her lifetime of service to help lift others to become leaders in their communities, Genie managed to have four daughters in six years! Her daughters say their mother was the picture of ethics, integrity and hard work and taught them through good example. Genie lives in Dallas, has seven grandchildren and fourteen great-grandchildren.

We are honored to know Genie Fritz and thank her for her many years of service to the League and the community.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHTS

BOARD MEMBER KATHERINE SAVERS McGOVERN joined the LWV Dallas Board in June 2017. For a number of years, she has been involved with the League of Women Voters, with efforts to register voters, efforts to engage voters and others in discussions of public policy and common good issues, and in efforts to get people to vote.



Katherine retired from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of the United States Attorney, Dallas Division, April 2011 after approximately 21 years as an Assistant United States Attorney responsible for representing the interests of the United States of America in significant civil litigation. After retirement and a vacation to England and France, Katherine was elected as the 2012 Democratic nominee for Congressional District 32 against incumbent Pete Sessions. While not successful,

Katherine gained significant knowledge and understanding of the concerns, interests and expectations of the people living in CD 32. In 2016, Katherine was a Delegate to the Democratic National Convention in Philadelphia.

On occasion, she has been a public speaker before the Dallas City Council and the Dallas County Commissioners Court on public policy issues pending decision. Katherine has served as a Dallas County Election Judge in numerous elections since 2008 and is a deputy voter registrar. She is currently President, Preston Royal Library Friends, and is an active supporter of the Dallas Public Library. Over the years, Katherine has been a volunteer with the North Dallas Shared Ministry.

Katherine currently practices law limited to civil matters. She maintains a highly selective practice designed to focus on using her knowledge and skills effectively.

HEROIC AFRICAN AMERICAN WOMEN

Sojourner Truth (nee Isabella Baumfree) 1797-1883. Born into slavery, she was a popular speaker in the 1840s with the abolitionist movement and in the 1850s on women's suffrage. Her most famous speech, *Ain't I a Woman*, was given in 1851 at a women's rights convention in Ohio.

Elizabeth "Bessie" Coleman 1892–1926. Unable to gain admission to American flight schools because she was black and a woman, Coleman went to France for lessons. On June 15, 1921, she became the first woman to earn an international aviation license and the world's first licensed black aviator.

She returned to the U.S. and began teaching other black women to fly, giving lectures and performing at flying exhibitions.

HEROIC NATIVE AMERICAN WOMEN

Lyda Conley (Wyandot) 1874-1946. The first woman admitted to the Kansas Bar, she is also the first Native American female attorney and first Native American woman admitted to argue a case before the U.S. Supreme Court. She challenged the sale and development of the Huron Cemetery in Kansas City, Kansas, now the Wyandot National Burying Ground.

Wilma Pearl Mankiller 1945-2010. She was the first woman elected chief of the Cherokee Nation. In college she became involved in the movement for Native American rights and for women's equality. As a community organizer for the Cherokee Nation, she won grants for social welfare programs and tribal business interests. For her achievements, she was named *Ms. Magazine*'s Woman of the Year in 1987 and awarded the Medal of Freedom in 1998 by President Clinton.

IN DEFENSE OF THE LEAGUE

I've heard several comments lately about the League of Women Voters that made me cringe. The gist of the comments is that the League is "lightweight", a social organization not a serious one, that Leaguers don't really want to get things done.

The comments have come from people I respect – serious, socially aware people who are out in the community knocking on doors, writing letters, organizing demonstrations and canvasing for candidates. Why are they so critical of the League? Why do I see things so differently?

I gave the matter some thought and realize that there are a variety of ways that people and organizations contribute to the community. One particular form of social engagement is activism. Activism is the most intense way to contribute, and also the most visible. Activists seek to bring about social change by vigorously and publicly advocating for or opposing issues or policies or candidates. Activists are great. They heighten awareness, generate enthusiasm, and help to define issues. Activists are often associated with political campaigns, working their hearts out for the candidates they believe in. They are the visible promoters of causes like civil rights. women's rights and gun control. The people I've heard who expressed criticism of the League are activists.

In truth, we do a lot. Our Voters Guides are recognized everywhere and loved. We register voters, conduct educational programs and candidate forums, do serious research and advocate for public policy. Most recently our focus has been on the education of young voters because the need is so great. At the state and national level, Leagues have been major parties in the legal battles to protect the vote. We should be very proud of these accomplishments.

What all our activities have in common is that they are peaceful and orderly. We take great pains to ensure that our information to the public is competent. We are careful that political candidates understand we will not let our personal preferences spill over into our League work. Public organizations like schools trust us to be unbiased, competent, and disciplined to let us in the door. We cannot work with politicians or public institutions unless they are confident we will not embarrass them without cause or disrupt their flow. The League's need to be able to work in a variety of politically charged and sensitive settings is unique, I believe.

I also believe that, because our activities are measured and peaceful as opposed to intense and noisy, it appears to some activists that we are not serious or that we are not doing anything, which is not correct. Our style is different, and intense activists will not always recognize what we do. We accomplish a lot and our work is valuable to the community.

We might, however, take their criticisms as a sign we need to be more aggressive in letting people know what we're up to. If we're proud of what we're doing, we should brag a bit. Letters to the editor, op-eds, public appearances, social media campaigns – all these would be helpful. We're more than just photo ops at luncheons. We're not out marching in the streets like our suffragette ancestors, but our vast network of Leaguers is as busy as ever, making democracy work!
