## LWVOA Urges Voters to Prepare for Elections Using Vote411.org

The website, which the national League of Women Voters launched in 2006, serves as a one-stop-shop for nonpartisan election related information and responses to relevant questions for federal and state races and ballot proposals. Candidate information for some local races and proposals are also included. <u>VOTE411.org</u> also assists voters in finding their polling places, hours and learning about candidate forums. Additional resources for how to navigate elections during the COVID-19 pandemic is also included.

VOTE411.org is also available in Spanish. Like the League, VOTE411.org, is nonpartisan in so far as it offers information on candidates in races for all political parties. The site aims to safeguard democracy by driving voter engagement. The League will also issue a print voter guide in September for the November election.

# **Vote from Home**

All Michigan voters have the right to vote by mail for the August and November elections by applying to receive an absentee ballot. The Secretary of State is mailing all registered voters absentee voter ballot applications which allow you to apply for both elections in 2020. If you do not receive your application via the mail, you can apply online at <u>Michigan.gov/vote</u>. As before, you can also sign up for the permanent absentee voter list to receive an absentee ballot application before every election.

Remember for the primary, you must choose a party; in other words, you cannot split your ticket.

## **Annual Business Update**

A notice was mailed in May, stating that the 2020 LWVOA Annual Meeting had been cancelled in response to COVID-19. However, we are still conducting the business required by our bylaws virtually as other Leagues are doing, using on-line voting survey and a paper survey. Informational materials were mailed and may be referenced through links in the survey.

You are able to vote on 2020-2021 budgets as well as officers, directors, and off-board nominating committee members. We also asked for annual approval of our local program positions and sought directives to the board from our membership. We are looking for responses by June 25-30.

## **Candidate Forum Update**

Candidate forums are underway. These forums are being conducted on the Zoom platform, recorded and made available on the <u>LWVOA website</u> and shared with any local government or TV that have the ability to share the forum.

Even with the new venue, the League is able to maintain previous standards for forums including the following:

- The League of Women Voters invites all qualified candidates through U.S. Mail and email to participate in a forum the League is sponsoring. Write-ins who have qualified before the date of the forum are also included.
- If a candidate cannot attend the forum, the candidate must notify the League of Women Voters Oakland Area representative at least 24 hours prior to the start of the forum. If a candidate is unable to attend, a written, brief statement may be submitted to the League of Women Voters to be read by the moderator. Its length cannot exceed the time allotted for a candidate's opening statement.

*Strangers in Their Own Land: Anger and Mourning on the American Right* by Arlie Russell Hochschild (**July 28**, time and location TBD)



In this book, the renowned sociologist Arlie Hochschild embarks on a thought-provoking journey from her liberal hometown of Berkeley, California, deep into Louisiana bayou country - a stronghold of the conservative right. As she gets to know people who strongly oppose many of the ideas she famously champions, Hochschild nevertheless finds common ground and quickly warms to the people she meets, among them a Tea Party activist whose town has been swallowed by a sinkhole caused by a drilling accident - people whose concerns are actually ones that all Americans share: the desire for community, the embrace of family, and hopes for their children.
