President's Letter



Happy January, LWVPA Members!

Each month there are so many League topics to cover that it is sometimes hard to select just one for the President's Letter. This month, as we start 2024, that was not the case. One topic jumped to the top of the list: Fair Districts, or *let's just end gerrymandering in Ohio once and for all*!

As shown on this Ohio Redistricting Reform Timeline, LWV Ohio (LWVO) has worked for over 40 years to end gerrymandering. (Note that we have been opposed at times by Democratic politicians, Republican politicians, and sometimes opposed by both parties AT THE SAME TIME!) In 2015 and 2018, voters of Ohio overwhelmingly passed antigerrymandering state constitutional amendments. Unfortunately, Ohio politicians and lobbyists keep finding ways to skirt the amendments. And yet, we are not giving up!

<u>LWVO</u>, Local Leagues, <u>Fair Districts Ohio</u> (a coalition led by Common Cause Ohio and LWVO) and many other organizations are working under the umbrella of the <u>Citizens</u> <u>Not Politicians (CNP) campaign</u> to get the <u>CNP Amendment</u> on the 2024 General Election ballot. To meet the 2024 ballot goal, 413,488 VALID voter signatures are needed by July 3, 2024.

LWVPA is already helping to gather these signatures. We have an impressive Fair Districts / CNP committee with Karen Roderick-Lingeman leading the team. So, here is my ask: can you help this committee collect signatures? Here are ways you can help – and they do not all involve a clipboard!

- 1) If you belong to a book club, a church group, or other organization that meets locally, invite us to collect signatures at your next meeting. We will arrive before your meeting starts, collect signatures as your members arrive, and we will leave once your meeting starts.
- 2) Let us know of an event where we could collect signatures either outdoors or indoors.
- 3) Sign our Citizens Not Politicians petition. If you want to sign, but have not had the opportunity, let us know and we will contact you and make arrangements for you to sign.
- 4) Are you just itching to get a clipboard in your hand and help us collect signatures? You will get training and you can be paired with another team member.
- 5) If you are interested in any of the above or have other suggestions for the team, please email lwvperrysburg@gmail.com and we will get in touch.

My Life as a Poll Worker ...

My experience as a poll worker has been nothing less than spectacular. I decided to become a poll worker when there was an outcry for help from the Wood County

Board of Elections in 2021. I thought it would be a great way to learn how the system worked and to give back to democracy.

While the day is long ... we report at 5:30 and leave well after 8:00pm ... it is a fun day. You get many breaks throughout the day and work several different stations so it doesn't get boring.

Each precinct has a Republican and Democrat Manager, and there are equal numbers of both parties working at all times. Training is provided before each election, and you do get paid for training and for working.

How things are run in each voting precinct can be a little different. It is up to the location manager and the voting location. My location allows us to have a potluck, and it is where I would vote anyway, so I get to see many familiar faces of friends and neighbors. It is a fun, rewarding day, knowing that I am helping the democratic process that we are so blessed to have. I have made new friends, reconnected with old friends and would recommend the experience to everyone, so that they see how the process works, the safety precautions taken and the ins and outs of being a Deputy of a Voting Location.
