Do you want your Leaders selected by the People or by Chance?

Below are four examples of where chance was used to settle a tied vote:

- **2017 State House election in Virginia**: After the recount was completed, the 2017 Virginia State House Election was a tied vote. As required by state law, the election was then decided by a drawing. So instead of the will of the citizens deciding who their representative will be, it was decided by chance.
- The **1994 Wyoming's House of Representatives race** is another example of a drawing settling an election. Republican Randall Luthi and Independent Larry Call each finished with 1,941 votes. Following a recount that produced the same results, Governor Mike Sullivan settled the election in a most unconventional (although state-appropriate) fashion: drawing a ping pong ball out of his cowboy hat to determine a winner.
- **2002 Nevada**: In Nevada they settle ties by drawing playing cards, with the high card taking home the election spoils. In 2002, Republican Dee Honeycutt came up short, drawing a jack of diamonds to Democrat R.J. Gillum's jack of spades for a seat on the Esmeralda County Commission.
- 2011 Nevada: Card justice was again deployed, when Tanya Flanagan and Linda Meisenheimer tied in a North Las Vegas city council primary, and neither candidate wanted to pony up \$600 for the cost of a recount. Meisenheimer ended up drawing a king to Flanagan's five.

In each of the above examples if just one more person had voted in the election, the will of the people would have decided the outcome. Don't leave your representation to chance.

Be the vote that breaks the tie!

#### **Board Briefs**

From September 4, 2018

Meeting was brought to order at 10:00 a.m. with all officers and directors present

- ✓ Gene Zingarelli and Will Richards (guest member) presented a letter drafted by Will and addressed to Deborah Fudge (Board Chair of SMART) and Chris Coursey (SR mayor) expressing LWVSC support for the at-grade crossing at Jennings Avenue. It was agreed that board members would send comments to Gene and Will prior to the Advocacy meeting on September 12. The final version, to be signed by the Co-Presidents, could be voted on by email, but Juanita reminded the group that an email vote would need to be unanimous.
- ✓ Judy Levy reported on outreach activities to schools with potential plans for mock elections in the middle schools in spring 2019. Activities partnering with Los Cien and the YMCA continue to be advanced. described Debbie McKay activities supporting the (Get Out the Vote) campaign. Juanita reminded about the "no bribing" policy (for registering to vote) that needs to be maintained at tabling events. The Board approved spending limits of \$50 for tabling events and \$1,000 for GOTV materials.
- Nancy Burrington gave an update on the Rohnert Park City Council forum on Friday, Sept. 14. She had questions about how to get the recorded version done by RP City posted to our website and YouTube. Susan Novak volunteered to organize the Santa Rosa City Council forum. Leona Judson discussed the latest plans for Pros and Cons presentations. (Consult the calendar for up-to-date information on all forums and pros and Cons presentations)

- ✓ Juanita Roland presented the Treasurer's report. Because of Suzy Marzalek's resignation as Treasurer a long discussion followed about how to move forward without the services of a Treasurer. Suzy left very organized and clear information on the responsibilities of the Treasurer. It has been suggested that a bookkeeping service might be hired to perform some of the tasks. Rick Luttmann has volunteered to assume the role. Donna Roper, who will be meeting with him, will inquire about his level of interest, his time constraints and previous experience. Since Nancy Burrington is the remaining Officer with check-writing capacity it was agreed to add Susan Novak as a signatory on our accounts (Exchange Bank).
- ✓ Gayle Peterson is working on producing the membership roster. As it is a fairly complicated process, it was decided to give more responsibility to the printer. Gayle will continue to update the primary member database to keep it current. After a fairly lengthy discussion it was agreed that Gayle could spend up to \$1,000 to get the help she needs to update and produce the roster.
- ✓ Mary Virdeh reported that the Kick-Off meeting is set for September 13 at Roseland School. The Board approved up to \$300 to be spent on catering for the event.
- ✓ Anita Lytle distributed business cards to members and agreed to write confirming letters to those who donate \$250 or more (for tax purposes), normally a Treasurer task.
- ✓ Juanita will produce an October Voter. Calendar items, articles and pictures due to her by September 23.

The committee went ahead with a letter (by member Will Richards) for the board's approval to send to the SMART Board and the Santa Rosa City Council.

With regard to alternative voting systems, member Rick Luttmann presented options to the "vote for one" system. The LWV California has its recommendations on the November ballot propositions at LWVC.org.

## The League's Fall Kickoff Event GET OUT THE VOTE IN NOVEMBER!



Our speaker was Oscar Chavez, the Deputy Director of the Sonoma County Human Services Department whose topic was Latino Voting. He is also a Los Cien member who arrived in our county as a child from Mexico. He became a citizen after going to college. Important points and questions arising from his presentation:

- Latinos are a diverse group divided by the time they came to the U.S.
- Important issues for everyone are education, jobs, healthcare, and housing.
- The largest segment of Latinos are millennials (births 1980-2000).
- The Sonoma County population is becoming "grayer" (senior citizens) and "browner" (Latino).
- To get Latinos to vote will take a lot of knocking on doors several times.
  - How to get and train local canvassers? How to fund the structure to enable this?
- Many Latinos don't see themselves in the issues being presented to voters.
  - How can we change the situations so Latinos see themselves in the issues?
- There's a need for forums on issues, e.g., getting together members of groups who support and need affordable housing and those who prefer it to be elsewhere.
- Los Cien's goals are very similar to LWVSC's, including member and community education and engagement. Los Cien is also trying to recruit candidates for elected offices.
- Latinos are underrepresented in government and leadership positions in Northern California compared to what is present in Southern California.
- Potential Latino candidates need social contacts to support their candidacy with help and funds from those with the know-how.
