The Chief will do a presentation on the future of the Perrysburg Police Division, including his vision for Perrysburg and the department's new radio

system.

Chief Jones oversees a division that employs 35 sworn officers and 13 civilian employees. His duties include personnel and resources planning, maintenance of division policies, the preparation and management of an annual operating

#### **Board Letter**

Happy Autumn League Members,

Did you know there are 30 League Chapters in Ohio? All 30 chapters fall under the umbrella of the League of Women Voters of Ohio (LWVO).

The LWVO communicates with each League member via email to inform us of action alerts, lobbying efforts for policy change, and how we, as a local chapter or as an individual, can get involved to affect change.

One piece of the LWVO's communication chain that you may not have taken part in is the All-Member Call. Held on the first Tuesday of each month from noon – 1:00 p.m., every League member can join the call and hear more in-depth info about current activities the League is championing.

For instance, the October call was about Dark Money and was fascinating. A guest speaker gave us background information on the "dark" TV ads we were seeing related to the Ohio energy referendum that was taking place at the time of the call. We learned about the LWVO's plans (and how we as local chapters can get involved) to combat Dark Money in Ohio. It was certainly a call that fired you up!

The subjects vary from month-to-month, and since it is an All-Member Call, and not open to non-league members, the LWVO often shares strategies and behind-the-scenes info that we would not otherwise be privy to.

You don't have to sign up. Just watch your inbox and a couple days before the scheduled call you will receive an email from the LWVO. It will have a phone and pin number you will use to make the call. You should be on a phone that you can mute. Non-League members should not be invited to join the call.

The League is very prompt in starting and ending the call on time, so it is easy to schedule into your day. Take advantage of the All-Member Call. You will find it a worthwhile "perk" of being a League member.

# LWV of Perrysburg — Our Beginnings

Part 3 "1960's"

#### FROM THE VILLAGE VOTER (League newsletter)

**Feb.15, 1960** — An article with the title *League of Women Pool* appeared which seems relevant — "What makes a League discussion different? 1. It is not "just talk." 2. Each member takes part. 3. It promotes the kind of discussion that unites rather than divides. 4. It develops agreement on which to base action. 5. It pools ideas, information, facts and action. "C'mon get in the swim!"

**Feb. 28, 1961**— After 9 years membership stands at 146 but not many attended the last general membership meeting. The proposed Local Program for 1961-62 is: 1. A study of the operating Expense and Building Needs of the PB School district. 2. A study of PB Area Growth and Services. NOTE — After the study the group decided that PB needs a new high school but the League does not support the 3-mill operating levy.

**April 8, 1962** — At the April 28, 1962 meeting there was unanimous support for the proposed high school, and the League voted to assist with passage of the bond levy in the May election.

**Nov. 15, 1962** — Babysitting provided at the Carranor during the meeting — "slippers are suggested to soften the patter of little feet." (Note: on Oct. 15, 1963 babysitting still provided for the morning at 50 cents)

**Nov. 15, 1963** — June Kruger, Voter Service chair, completed, with the aid of many members, a compilation of all unregistered voters residing in Perrysburg Township. The information was given to both political parties. This was the first time ever attempted!

**Sept. 15, 1964** — Membership last year reached 164. Dues should be renewed. They are \$4.00 a year. Members should push husbands to join.

**Nov. 15, 1965** — It was noted that 68% of the registered voters turned out for the Nov. 2 Election — 69.9% City and 65% Perrysburg Township.

**March**, **1969** — Annual Finance Drive needs help. Also, membership so far is 64 members so there is a need for people to renew their membership.
