

Board Letter

Dear League Members,



"Speaking With One Voice" is a phrase applicable to LWV, but what does that mean? To answer that question, we need a little background info, and that starts with advocacy.

LWV's advocacy is based upon League Principles, Positions, Priorities, and Program/ Projects. They build upon each other. Think of it as an organizational flowchart with Principles at the top of the chart:

- 1) Principles are what we believe as an organization and are applicable to National, State, and Local Leagues.
- 2) Positions are formalized studies by the membership to support our principles. Once a position is formally adopted, we may choose to take action on the issue.
- 3) Priorities are those positions on which we want to focus and act upon over the next one-to-two-years.
- 4) Program is the umbrella which covers the projects and actions we take to advance our Positions and may include, studies, forums, letters-to-the-editor, completing Action Alerts, lobbying elected officials, or community events just to name a few.

Speaking With One Voice

The above outlines the establishment of our advocacy and action. Next, we must ensure our advocacy is messaged in a consistent and coordinated manner at all levels of League. This task is accomplished by "speaking with one voice," which gives only League presidents the authority to speak on behalf of the League. It's important that we all abide by "speaking with one voice," and it's easy to do if you keep these two points in mind from League Basics:

- 1) Only the League president (or designee) speaks for the League in an official capacity.
- 2) However, members are encouraged to take action on League topics as informed individuals, not mentioning their affiliation with the LWV.

If you receive a question or a request from the media or other organization regarding a LWV position or viewpoint, do not give an answer. Instead, contact our President, Jacki Stedman, with the details of the request.

This topic is being highlighted, not because we have had any issues in our League, but to keep you informed. It is important information for new members to know and a good reminder for us "veteran" members. If you have questions about this subject, feel free to contact me.

If you google how can I help save the planet, you will find hundreds of ideas. Some seem so

obvious, but for me a reminder helps. Run multiple errands at a time to save fuel. Share/rent tools rather than buying your own, Buy local foods to save on transport emissions. Carpool. Collect memories, not things. Plant trees, etc.

Education: Monitor current issues in education with continued support of to ensure good academic programs for the Perrysburg School District (including Penta County) for a good academic program. Support levies (both property and income tax) when shown to be needed to sustain current educational standards and/or to provide specific needed improvements or maintenance. Study Review and analyze bond levies to finance new buildings, additions to current buildings and/or purchase of existing buildings when designed for economy and flexibility in adapting to future space and program needs.

Parks, Recreation and the Arts: Support of the Perrysburg area recreation needs and their financing with continued support for a well-rounded program for parks and recreation by the city, township and county.

Health and Welfare: Support effective services to meet the basic physical and mental needs of Wood County residents with consideration of programs to meet future needs.

Youth Issues: Support of Youth Services in Wood County to achieve maximum benefit of available funding to alleviate youth problems.

Human Trafficking: Support efforts to combat human forced labor and sex trafficking. Support creation and improvement of services to victims of human trafficking to facilitate their integration into the community. Support efforts of local and state agencies to aggressively enforce the trafficking laws and prosecute traffickers and offenders (consumers). Support training and education of the public, law enforcement, and service providers regarding human trafficking.

Aging in Place: support of efforts to allow for residents to age in place in Perrysburg and Perrysburg Township.

Government

Public Transportation: Support public transportation in the Perrysburg area with particular attention to the special needs of the physically and economically challenged. Continue to advocate for public transportation in the Perrysburg area.

Public Safety: Support public safety, including police and fire departments of Northern Wood County, the transportation of hazardous waste and safety in schools and other public areas.

Library Services: Support of good library services with adequate funding.

Finances: Monitor the financial accountability in <u>Perrysburg City</u> local governments (city, township and county) with consideration of hiring, overtime, purchases, collective bargaining and budgeting.

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Regional Planning: Support of participation of City and Township in regional planning and regional projects.

Natural Resources

Clean Water: Support continued public access to clean and safe water. This support would include, but not be limited to:

A. Improved waste water transportation and treatment systems, economical system for sludge disposal and monitoring of water quality.

B. Precautionary moratorium on all new Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs) that produce untreated animal waste that jeopardizes ground water quality.

C. Continued monitoring of hydraulic fracturing (fracking) and outcomes that may endanger water access and quality.

D. Protection of water quality in the local aquifer, the waters of Perrysburg Township, the City of Perrysburg, the Maumee River and Lake Erie.

E. Support efforts to educate community and reduce use of plastics in League and city activities.

Transportation of Hazardous Materials: Support of state signage and traffic patterns for all state and interstate highways, including access roads and rail transportation routes where hazardous materials are transported.

Recycling Waste: Support recycling in the Perrysburg area, including curbside recycling availability.

Land Use

Community Planning: Continued support of community planning (land use policies and procedures) to meet the changing needs of the Perrysburg area. Keeping currently abreast and monitoring planning, zoning, zoning appeals commissions in the City, Township and County, with emphasis on promoting orderly growth.

Historic Preservation: Support of historic preservation which should be of benefit to the Perrysburg area and of the City's historic zoning ordinance.

Voter Participation

Support efforts to educate community members on the importance of voting activities that may include voter registration, how and where to vote, candidate information and promoting maximum turnout at all elections and citizen participation in government. Support may include but not be limited to:

- a. voter registration
- b. how and where to vote
- c. candidate information
- d. promoting maximum turnout at all elections
- e. citizen participation in government.
