League of Women Voters US Convention

The League holds its annual convention in Chicago, IL – June 28 through July 1, 2018

President Betsy Patterson, Membership Director Pat Butler, and Director at Large Matty Park represented Ventura County at the 2018 LWV National Convention. It was a whirlwind four days for action-packed meetings, caucuses and workshops. We attended about 50 hours of events all together, meeting competent, hardworking, impressive people from all over the county.

We started with **"Developing and Mobilizing Skills to Win in 2018"** directed at making the League a "winning" organization. We learned about the "power over," the "power to," the "power with," and the "power within," - four kinds of power to get things done; the difference between power and privilege, between organizing and mobilizing; and to how to write an effective "Ask" letter and the different kinds of "No".

One of the main topics throughout the convention was **"Diversity, Equity and Inclusion."** No more just talking about diversity; it is time for the League to become a reflection of our communities. We learned that to be a successful organization we must recognize our individual unconscious biases, reflect on ourselves, become comfortable with uncertainty, engage with people who are different from ourselves and be open to feedback from them on how we are doing. More training to come....

At **"Promoting League Work – Guide Creation and Fundraising"** we learned some successful fund-raising techniques that we think may be doable here. More on that later too....

We heard from Leagues involved in **high school voter registration** projects. We heard a panel of three experts talking about **"Election Day: Are We Ready?"** in terms of security, efficiency, accessibility and integrity. We voted on the 2018-2020 National Program which includes support for the Equal Rights Amendment, the National Popular Vote for President Compact, as well as programs for "Making Democracy Work," like Voter Protection & Mobilization, Election Integrity, Campaign Finance Reform, and Redistricting issues.

Look to the Past to Grow Voters' Engagement

How to Excite Voters With a Deep Dive Into History

Voter apathy often comes from not understanding our nation's history and how the institutions we take for granted, and even consider carved in stone, came to be. One of the sessions at the LWVUS convention in Chicago was from the League in Greenwich, CT, which had piloted a successful civics education program in partnership with area high schools, using cases from Harvard Business School Professor David Moss's recent book, *Democracy: A Case Study*.

Survey results from the pilot showed significantly increased interest in voting, political engagement, and constructive political dialogue. These case studies bring our history to life and humanize the struggles of our founding fathers (and other change-makers, like the suffragettes), and the compromises they made, to give us the government we have today.

Dr. Moss has a generous private donor through 2019 to create and promote the project, so educating teachers to be facilitators in this method in Cambridge, or having him travel to our location, is subsidized. This seems like an ideal opportunity to help both students and adults better understand the vibrancy of our system and how important their participation is.

If you're intrigued you can read Dr. Moss's book, but I suggest getting the kindle version – I bought the hardcover and boy, it weighs a ton! Submitted by Matty Park, Director

Notes from July LWVVC In/Out Board Meeting

Topics Covered and "To Do" List:

■ President's Report – Betsy Patterson welcomed new board members. Determined Executive Committee will make emergency decisions between regular board meetings. Board notebook, current schedule and location of board meetings discussed. Board concurred with the Budget subcommittee's guidelines on the budget. Board encouraged to donate to the League.

■ Membership Committee – Pat Butler stated membership stands at 94. Subcommittee to begin plans for September membership meeting. Distribution of fees to state and national leagues discussed as well as getting new members involved, and fundraising.

■ Voter Services Report – Pat Essick stated National Voter Registration Day is September 25 and efforts to get students registered were discussed. Pat and David Maron are working on a list of possible voter forums and the Pros and Cons presentation for upcoming elections.

■ Programs and Events – Items discussed were the Holiday Luncheon, Spring Event, Annual Meeting, and Ojai Pub Nights..

■ The Voter – Will now be published quarterly with 3-month calendars emailed to the membership.

Scholarship Committee – Melanie Ashen will continue as Chair. Recruitment efforts to secure one more person for the committee.

Advocacy Committee – Will commence after election.

■ Media – Website will be administered by Betsy Patterson. Chelsea Sutula and Matty Park to handle our Facebook page. Directory responsibility by Barbara Doyle and Judy Murphy. Press releases handled by Maria Runyon, and calendar updates by Betsy Patterson.

■ New Business – Matty Park presented on an idea from the convention regarding using history/civics to engage the electorate and training for "classes" available in September. Write-up of Caucus seminar distributed by Betsy Patterson.

Summary of Budget Philosophy Meeting held on June 20, 2018

Because we found ourselves discussing repeatedly whether an item should be covered by the budget or not, we decided the Board needed to have a subcommittee discuss the philosophy of how our budget should work. We began with three possible approaches:

#1: Spend only as much as is received each year, leaving the Reserve funds untouched.
#2: Attempt to spend only as much as is received, knowing that the Reserve funds provide a source of funds for unexpected expenses; there should be a basic Reserve maintained at all times.
#3: The budget is a guideline which can be reviewed and revised during the year as needed; new expense items will be considered in the following year's budget to determine if they should be included or if a new source of income needs to be developed to cover new items.

We discussed the pros and cons of each approach, including having funds available to meet our mission and goals for each year, the need for fund-raising if we fall short of budget, limitations on beginning new programs not included in the annual budget, and the risk of running out of funds and being able to continue as an organization.

We concluded that our best approach would be to assure we maintain a basic reserve to assure continuation of our organization, but that we should be able to fund new activities as they arise during the year. We felt it would be wise to try and stay within our budget but agreed that we could afford to use up to \$2000 per year from our reserve funds to support unanticipated needs. We agreed that this approach should be reviewed and discussed on a yearly basis.

In addition, we adopted a "time-adjusted" budget, following expenses month-to-month in the itemized budget and making adjustments with Board approval. Again, we set the limit of \$2,000 to cover unanticipated expenses. We also want to track actual costs, including "in-kind" donations, so that we can better plan the following year's budget. We continue to encourage minimizing our expenses, for example, trying to find free venues, keeping refreshments simple, and collaborating with other organizations to save costs. However, we also recognize the importance of fun and engaging events to attract new members so there will be expenses that are necessary.

We have varying expenses depending on whether it is an election year or not. We will attempt to be thrifty but we will always defer to our mission:

Empowering Voters. Defending Democracy.
