Immigration in SE Pennsylvania: An Overview — May 10

Hot Topics don't get any hotter than this: Immigration Issues in SE Pennsylvania — The Big Picture. Please join LWVCDC for this important program about the immigrants living among us, May 10, 1 p.m., by Zoom.

Our speakers will be Steven Larin, the Deputy Director of Nationalities Service Center (NSC) and Exequiel (Zeke) Hernandez, professor at the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania.

Mr. Larin is an attorney specializing in removal defense, asylum, and immigrant youth issues. He



leads NSC's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion program and has served as an Adjunct Professor for the Immigration Law Clinic at Temple University – Beasley School of Law and for the Political Science Department at La Salle University.

publishes pioneering research examining how immigration patterns affect the investment choices, strategic decisions, and performance of firms in foreign markets. The linkage between immigration and economic growth in this line of work has crucial implications for immigration policy. His forthcoming book, The Truth About Immigration: Why Successful Societies Welcome Newcom-

ers, will be published June 4 from St. Martin's Press. It is available for pre-order now wherever books are sold.

The book is an accessible, apolitical, and evidence-based look at how newcomers affect our local communities and our nation. It talks about the impact of immi-

grants on investment and job creation, and issues such as jobs, crime, and undocumented immigrants.

The League of Women Voters has three levels of organizational structure consisting of national, state and local levels. Through my President's message in February, March and April I have shared how the League of Women Voters advocates to influence public policy. This month, I am focusing on our local league, LWV of Central Delaware County and how it advocates to influence public policy.

The League of Women Voters of Central Delaware County (LWVCDC) Legislative Advocacy Committee works with individual lawmakers, lawmaking bodies and partners to gain support for a League position, initiative, issue or specific legislation in Harrisburg. It involves speaking out on behalf of an issue, conducting various kinds of public events, getting coverage in the media, building public awareness and better understanding among the League and the public.

Legislative Advocacy Chair: <u>Jodine Mayberry</u> will hold an inaugural legislative advocacy committee meeting by Zoom, April 11 at 5 p.m. If you wish to attend, please email her and she'll add you to her contact list.

Whether you join the committee or not, as a LWV member you can seize opportunities to advocate throughout the year, by attending our hot topics, writing or emailing your congress members and state legislators in response to our action alerts and so on.

LWVCDC members are invited to participate in the **4th Annual ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE DAY March and Caravan, Saturday, April 20,** beginning at **Noon**. The starting point is Chester City Hall 1 E 4th St, Chester, PA 19013 and it will end at the <u>Covanta trash incinerator</u>. This environmental justice day is sponsored by <u>Chester Residents Concerned for Quality Liv-</u>

ing (CRCQL) with the purpose to generate awareness of the pollution from the nation's largest trash incinerator and its detrimental impacts to the health of residents in the city and across the county.

Those who cannot walk any distance are invited to caravan by car behind the walkers. The caravan will organized at the City Hall start.

Go to Harrisburg with CeaseFirePA May 7

Join CeaseFirePA and its dozens of partners, including the League of Women Voters of Pennsylvania, at a rally and lobby day in Harrisburg, Tuesday, May 7, from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. to demand action on two gun safety bills passed by the House last year.

House Bill 1018 would create a process by which firearms could be removed from at-risk individuals and House Bill 714



would provide for increased background checks when purchasing firearms in PA. A new bill, HB 777 banning ghost guns (made on 3-D printers) just passed the House as well. They are now stuck in the PA Senate Judiciary Committee with no sign of movement.

To sign up for the rally go to <u>CeaseFirePA</u>, and fill out the form. Please note, there will be a bus from Delaware County. Some LWV members have signed up for the bus but can drive if necessary. Details on the bus have not been released yet.

LWVPA is having its own lobbying day the next day, Wednesday, May 8, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Join the state at the capitol to collaborate with League members, meet with your legislators, and advocate for League priorities. Register <u>HERE</u> and notify Anne if you're going.

Urgent: Don't let Your Mail-In Ballot be Thrown Out

Election deniers and voter suppressers are doing everything they can to attack mail-in voting and they recently succeeded with a ruling from the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit that held that undated and improperly dated mail-in ballots cannot be counted. Don't let the election deniers take away your right to vote by mail.

It remains to be seen whether Delaware County and other counties will take steps to allow voters to cure their ballot mistakes, but the best plan is to not make any errors in the first place. Remember, **seal** your filled-out ballot in the smaller ballot envelope, put it in the outer "declaration (return) envelope," **sign and date** that envelope (with the date you are filling out the ballot), seal and return via mail or drop boxes by election day. Proposed 2024-2025 Local Program

The goal for the 2024-2025 Local Program is to develop <u>committees</u> to address and work on local program initiatives with the intent to become more active and involved in all the communities we serve. Members will vote on these proposals at the annual meeting in June.

I. GOVERNMENT: Engage members and community in all levels of government.

A. Voting Rights and Participation through Education and Action:

Protect the right to vote and security of the election process for every Delaware County citizen.

Encourage everyone to participate in the electoral process:

- a) Conduct voter registration drives and voter information events.
- b) Educate voters through candidate forums.
- c) Promote and expand Vote411.org
- d) Provide accurate information to community groups about voting and election procedures.
- e) Work with schools to build awareness of the importance of voting and how governments work.
- f) Continue voter education for in-person voting and/or mail-in voting and election security.

g) Monitor PA and local legislation and election regulations related to voting rights and oppose legislation regarding voter suppression.

- h) Continue efforts to allow eligible prisoners to register to vote and use mail-in ballots to vote.
- i) Work with our partners that are part of the LWVCDC Voter Engagement Coalition.
- j) Encourage our members to be poll workers.

B. Municipal Government and Services: Enable members to understand the role of local government.

Continue to develop a "Know Your Community" model for <u>each municipality</u> our members represent.

- Support the Delaware County Health Department and the development of a mental health component.
- C. State and Federal Governments: Engage members and communities in the legislative process.

Conduct Legislator outreach.

Monitor government activities and take appropriate action.

Inform community members of government actions.

Advocate for legislation that meets member and community needs related to LWV positions.

Support LWVPA and LWVUS proposals and positions.

- II. EDUCATION: Support excellence and equity in our public school systems.
- A. Support the equitable distribution of state funding for k-12 education.
- B. Continue to develop Civic Education materials and presentations to be used in schools and communities.
- C. Continue our leadership role with the Regional Adolescent Sleep Needs Coalition (RASNC).
- D. Continue our leadership role focusing on the impact of social media on the mental health of youth and adults.

III. NATURAL RESOURCES: Support management and protection of natural resources in the public interest, including planning, land use, environmental quality and safety in our communities.

- A. Preservation and protection of open space for public use and monitor enforcement of land use ordinances.
- B. Advocate for renewable clean energy resources.
- C. Monitor legislation that impacts the environment within Delaware County.
- D. Promote the work of LWV of Delaware County Environmental Committee and Environmental Clearinghouse envirodelco.org.

IV. **CRIMINAL JUSTICE AND PRISON REFORM**: Monitor and advocate for improving the criminal justice system in Delaware County working with the LWV of Delaware County and Delaware County officials and advocacy groups.

V. **DIVERSITY, EQUITY and INCLUSION**: Support the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) <u>policy</u>, positions and programs of the <u>LWVUS</u> and <u>LWVPA</u>.

A. Use the <u>LWV DEI Lens</u> with all program and event development.
