Delaware's Affordable Housing Crisis
What Can We do about the Lack of Affordable Housing?
Monday, May 15, 7-8:30 P.M.

Not a day goes by without the lack of affordable housing being on the front page and the forefront of hardworking Delawareans seeking to have access to safe, decent and affordable housing. Over the past few months, we learned that there is a shortage of over 21,000 affordable and safe units for extremely low-income renters; maximum income of a four-person extremely low income household is \$26,500 and the average income to afford a two-bedroom is \$47,333. These statistics equal rising homelessness, widening racial inequalities, the continuation of unsafe and uninhabitable housing, rents that are out of reach and homeownership that cannot be realized. In the famous words of Dr. King “the time to act is now” – as a collective there is a need to organize at a state and local level to transform the political and economic structure throughout the state to give our elderly a dignified life and our youth an opportunity.

The LWV final session on affordable housing will be a facilitated discussion focused squarely on developing a transformative agenda to bring residents, advocates, state and local agencies together to develop a roadmap to stamp out the contributing factors to housing insecurities in our state.

final draft of the Comp Plan reflected their vision as to what is desirable for Sussex County's future. With Governor Carney's signing of the 2018 Comprehensive Plan on March 19, 2019, Sue Claire stepped down as chair of the Land Use Committee, as it had fulfilled its original goal. .

From 2019-2020, Sue Claire served with Carol Jones as LWVDE Co-President. She has since served as a Director on the LWVDE Board focusing primarily on completely re-drafting the existing Policies and Procedures. As of April 2023, she again serves as a Director on the LWVSCDE Board.

VICKY SESSOMS - DIRECTOR

She spent a year as a Fulbright scholar in Venezuela. She worked as a consultant for the US Senate Foreign Relations Committee and the US Senate-House Joint Economic Committee where she authored studies on the US aid program in Latin America. She made her home in Yonkers, NY, Washington, DC, Honolulu, HI, Basrah, Iraq, and Chevy Chase, MD, before moving to Dover in 1980.

She has been a board member of the League of Women Voters of Kent County for 40 years and served as its president for over 15 years. She has moderated the LWVKC and LWVDE Candidate Night debates and initiated the Dover League's monitoring of Resident Advisory Council Elections at sites of both the Delaware and Dover Housing Authorities.

She chaired the Dover League of Women Voters International Relations Committee, moderated its Great Decisions discussion program on global issues, and has taught courses on foreign policy to Capital School district teachers. She represented the Dover League as a delegate to a United Nations Conference of Non-Governmental Organizations. In 1992-95, she was appointed to the State of Delaware Social Studies Curriculum Frameworks Commission which reviewed and updated the State's elementary and secondary school social studies program.

She has served on the Capital School District's Diversity Committee and has been an administrator for the YWCA-sponsored Study Circles on Racism and Race Relations in Kent County. She was on the organizing committee of Kent County SURJ (Stand Up for What's Right and Just), former Governor Russell Peterson's initiative to reform Delaware's criminal justice system with emphasis on rehabilitation and eliminating minimum mandatory sentencing for non-violent drug offenders. She was awarded the Central Delaware NAACP Community Service Award and the DEMCO Delaware Multicultural and Civic Organization) Shofar Award for public service. In 2010, the League of Women Voters of Delaware honored her with its Flame of Democracy Award. She was appointed by the Dover City Council to serve on the Dover Human Relations Commission for 10 years.
