



Use this to guide to review your [county election website](#) and advocate for improvements if needed.

**#1. Does the county website have a page solely for election information?
Is election information so easy to find voters can't possibly miss it!**

- A limited number of clicks to find information.
- Does the election page use plain recognizable words and icons such as election, voting, voter, vote, register to vote, and vote by mail?
(Remember! Voters do not know to find election info at County Clerk or Tax Assessor/Collector.)

#2 Is the following election information up to date and accurate?

- Dates for Election Day & early voting period
- Deadlines for voter registration application, mail ballot application, and receipt of mail ballot
- Polling locations for early voting & Election Day
- Sample ballots
- Election results

#3 Is voter information included for:

- Military and overseas voters
- Student voters
- Voters with special needs

#4 Is Voter ID info provided, accurate and easy to read?

- Lists of seven acceptable voter IDs
- List other documents accepted if no photo ID and the need to sign a simple form
- Voter ID extras!
 - Name on ID and voter registration card must be substantially the same but not identical
 - Voter address on ID and official list of voters need not match
- Election officials and poll workers cannot question a voter about the use of an ID issues
