

Use this to guide to review your <u>county election website</u> and advocate for improvements if needed.

#1. Does the county website have a page solely for election information? Is election information so easy to find voters can't possibly miss it?

- A limited number of clicks to find information
- Plain, recognizable words and icons, such as election, voting, voter, vote, register to vote, and vote by mail
- Remember: Voters do not know to find election info at County Clerk or Tax Assessor/Collector.

#2 Is the following election information up to date and accurate?

- Dates for Election Day & early voting period
- Deadlines for voter registration application, mail ballot application, and receipt of mail ballot
- Polling locations for early voting and Election Day
- Sample ballots
- Election results

#3 Is voter information included for:

- Military and overseas voters
- Student voters
- Voters with special needs

#4 Is Voter ID information provided, accurate and easy to read?

- Lists of seven acceptable voter IDs
- · List of other documents accepted if no photo ID and the need to sign a simple form
- Voter ID extras!
 - Name on ID and voter registration card must be substantially the same but not identical
 - O Voter address on ID and official list of voters need not match
 - Election officials and poll workers cannot question a voter about the use of an ID issues
