The first concern, of course, is getting people out to vote. Equally important is informing voters about the various candidates and issues that they will be asked to vote on. It has become increasingly obvious that another need to be addressed with the voters is the process and security of the election itself. As we move toward the last phase of the campaign, and I believe the ugliest part of this election, the misinformation and disinformation being bantered about has become almost overwhelming and at the same time, dangerous.

As children, most of us started out believing some harmless untruths, myths, and stories. The first I can remember is Santa Claus. The falsehoods then continued on throughout childhood in the form of the Easter Bunny, big bad wolves that eat beloved family members, pigs that talk and build homes... the list goes on. Don't even get me started on whatever that Alice was doing in Wonderland! These mistruths (I hesitate to call them lies because that would assume my parents were liars) were for the most part, harmless stories, some that aimed to teach basic life lessons. The mistruths, misinformation, disinformation and yes, down-right lies that are being broadcast around leading up to this election are completely different. They are not harmless. They are causing actual harm to whole groups of people. As troubling as that is, the lack of honest information about the election bothers me the most

For several months now, with increasing frequency, statements have been made that throw doubt on the validity of the election. The seeds that have been sown grow into beliefs about whether the election is fair, correct, and free of fraudulent activity. ## **MAUCH MILLENNIAL PROJECT**

The Mauch Millennial Project is back at work with our new crop of student interns and Fellows!

At Lewisburg Area High School, our two interns for this year, Mariah Drexler and Lucie Gosson-Roy, are visiting senior classes to educate their peers on the importance of voting, where to find information about candidates and issues, how to register, and how and where to cast a ballot in the November election and beyond.

At Bucknell University, our three Bucknell Mauch Fellows, Zane Hensal, Morgan Levy, and Victoria Romero, have also been very busy registering students and sharing information. They have been visiting classes and have plans to visit fraternities and sororities and other student organizations. They have an Instagram account and have posted a video Morgan created that shows students how to register online. On September 30th and October 1st they will participate in a campus-wide voter registration drive organized by Student Life. They are also planning a program during which they will talk specifically about the issues in the upcoming election.

We are working with Mary Beth Harris, director of the Lewisburg Children's Museum, on a plan to let children select the next addition to the museum's collection. The staff will select three items from the LCM's wish list and kids will vote for the one they prefer. This will give them a chance to experience actual voting with real-world consequences. The voting will start in late September until election day, November 5<sup>th</sup>. We are holding a voter registration event at the LCM on Saturday, October 19th.

GENERAL ELECTION In-Person voting: Polls open from 7:00am to 8:00pm	November 5
First day to register to vote after the election	November 6
Last day for County Board of Elections to receive voted military and overseas absentee ballots (submitted for delivery no later than 11:59p.m. on November 4th)	November 12
