OCTOBER FORUM

Dr. Claire Campbell, Professor of History and Affiliated Faculty in Environmental Studies at Bucknell University, spoke at the LWVLA Forum on October 15th in the Community Room at the Public Library. Thirty-two people attended the presentation, *Think Globally, Act Locally: Learning from Environmental History and Taking Action.*

Dr. Campbell began her talk with a discussion of the slogan from the first Earth Day in 1970, "Think globally, Act locally". She pointed out that in the context of acting globally Pennsylvania was in many ways the keystone state, being both a major source of coal in the early nineteenth century and then a major source of oil in the late nineteenth and into the twentieth century.

Dr. Campbell had a number of slides starting with a quote from Benjamin Franklin illustrating the prevailing secular and religious attitude that land was a resource for man to utilize. Also, first starting with George Perkins Marsh in 1847, individuals had been arguing that local activity affected the climate.

Public policy became part of controlling and utilizing nature. For example, the Susquehanna River was declared a public waterway in 1771. Dr. Campbell cited the canal cut to Lewisburg and the Milton canal as examples of people altering the natural environment for industrial purposes. She concluded that just as those endeavors to alter the environment required community action, so changes to restore the environment will also require community action.

VOTER EDUCATION/REGISTRATION EVENT

On Saturday October 19th, the Mauch Project, along with the Lewisburg Children's Museum, sponsored a voter registration exhibit at the Lewisburg Children's Museum. Various league members were on hand to answer families' questions about the election. Children were encouraged to cast their votes to decide what the next exhibit at the museum will be. The choice is among musical instruments, a new sensory wall, or a new activity board. Voting will continue until November 5th when votes will be counted to decide the winning choice which the League's Mauch Project will fund. Adults could register to vote, apply for a mail in ballot, or access information about candidates. This multigenerational event provided something for everyone. It was the Lewisburg League Mauch Millennial Project that established the voting exhibit in 2019 at the Lewisburg Children's Museum where it is a permanent educational activity.

GIRL SCOUT PRESENTATION

Kandy Duncan, LWVLA President, presented two different programs to groups of Girl Scouts last month. One topic was the election, including some history of the process, and the security measures that surround a free and fair election. The second presentation described the history of the suffragette movement and the ratification of the 19th Amendment.
