NOVEMBER FORUM

On November 15th, Dr. Gregory Krohn, Bucknell Professor Emeritus of Economics, spoke on *Inflation: Causes, Consequences and Cures*.

The talk covered causes, consequences, and potential cures for recent inflation in the wake of the short, sharp recession caused by Covid-19 which ultimately led to a million deaths in the US. Professor Krohn showed how a confluence of the following forces led to increasing prices: decreased supply and overloaded supply chains due to Covid-19;

increased demand due to federal stimulus programs; the Fed's low interest rate policy; economic recovery. The situation was complicated by Russia's invasion of Ukraine, which affected energy supplies and prices. Despite all these factors, aggregate household wealth and real weekly earnings are higher now than at the start of the pandemic. Professor Krohn also discussed the effects of inflation, both expected and unexpected, and how inflation might be cured. Dealing with inflation through higher interest rates comes at a cost of increased unemployment.

BALLOT INTEGRITY

Recently the Board approved a project that will be completed before the 2024 election. The topic of the project is Ballot Integrity. The Board acknowledges that the vote and security of the ballot is under attack. In addition to the primary work that the League already is engaged in, this undertaking will focus on helping the electorate regain trust regarding the security of the election.

A task force has started the preliminary work in producing a product that can assist voters and the general public in gaining a clear picture of the election process. The initial phase of this endeavor is to outline the actual election procedures and all their moving parts. The plan is for the group to interview Greg Katherman, the Director of Elections, at some point after the election. The emphasis is to clarify how many safeguards and security measures are actually in place to ensure a safe and transparent election.



VOTER SERVICES REPORT

Be a Poll Worker!

Picture it: Election Day, November 8th, 2022, 5:45a.m., driving to a polling site in Union County. I am, you guessed it, a poll worker, for the first time. My experience started the night before the election by assisting with the polling site set up. You'll remember that in 2020 our league helped the Union County election office train community members on using the new Unisys voting machines. We took the new ballot marking devices to more than 20 sites to demonstrate their use. Now I was finally going to see them in action with voters. As a poll worker, I was observing voters filling out provisional ballots when they didn't bring in their mail-in ballots, helping voters who had moved discover their correct polling sites, and assisting voters with special needs who brought their helpers so they could vote. The team I worked with was well-coordinated and really helpful, not just to me but also to the members of the community who were voting at our polling place.

I was thrilled to be able to watch our democracy in action in a very convivial, direct fashion. I hope to be able to participate again, and I encourage other League members to consider working at the polls to understand how crucial the League's work is, in educating voters, helping them register, and teaching them the importance of the vote.

VOTE411

VOTE411 continues to educate more voters every year.

As you all know, our local League is a member of VOTE411. We use this site to provide content for our local *Voters Guide*. The *Voters Guide* editor, Sheri Stayton, is also the VOTE411 manager for the entire state of Pennsylvania. *Voters Guide* staff member, Liz Clement, worked closely with Sheri and tracked down non-responding candidates to encourage them to respond to VOTE411. Here are the National numbers for VOTE411:

- 304 *Voters Guides* were created in 43 states, 913 administrators
- 52,397 candidates responded to VOTE411 questions in 27,906 races
- More than 21 million page views for <u>www.vote411.org</u>, and more than 4.67 million users visited the site, logging 5.96 million sessions.

This year saw the most VOTE411 content ever, with the lowest website bounce rate, meaning that people accessed the site and spent time exploring it rather than simply closing it or clicking away directly.

For races on VOTE411 that were open to PA voters, we received an 86% response rate from candidates, broken down as follows:

- US Congress: 2/2 (100%) responded to VOTE411 questions.
- State-wide races: 14/15 candidates responded to VOTE411 questions.
- Locally: 50% of candidates for the PA State House of Representatives responded.

Overall response rate: 18/21 = 86%! Thank you, candidates, for taking the time to provide voters with your ideas.
