The Board of Directors met with the members of the LWVLA on Thursday, January 23rd, to discuss the state of the Lewisburg League. The Board felt that it was important that the members were aware of the difficulties that our League is facing as we move into a new year and into a new term for the League.

There were around 60 people at the meeting, which was huge. Members were given a chance to discuss the information presented to them. Many of the tenured members stood and voiced concern about not being able to fulfill the mission of the LWV. We heard wonderful stories about the time period when the League was strong and active. Members had received a document spelling out the problems the Board feels that the League is facing as we move forward into what is seemingly a new political era. These facts and the concept that one of the alternatives would be to disband the League were very sobering and frightening to all of us. We held the meeting to serve as an informational venue for members to voice their initial reactions, observations, and possible alternatives.

If this conversation was predicated on the lack of money or simply on the contentious relationship between the Republicans in Union County and the League, it would be simple. The problem, however, is not simple. It involves a lack of willing leadership and a lack of energy and drive from members.

MAUCH MILLENNIAL PROJECT

This year's group of Bucknell Mauch Fellows presented their final report to the Mauch Committee and the Board on January 24th, and we were delighted to learn that their work had a meaningful impact on campus. Zane Hensal ('26), Morgan Levy ('25), and Victoria Romero ('25) used a variety of strategies with the goal of making sure that their fellow students knew how to register to vote, what the deadlines were, where their polling place was located, and the importance of voting.

Morgan was in charge of social media; she created and posted informational materials and tutorials on registering to vote. Victoria was in charge of outreach to campus groups; she created a PowerPoint to use for presentations as well as a printable guide with everything a Bucknell student would need to know about registering and voting in Pennsylvania. Zane met with the head of the Union County Elections Office to make sure the information the students were preparing was 100% accurate.

The three visited classes to give a 20-minute presentation and they manned stations in the Langone Center. Outside rooms where the Political Science Department was hosting a lecture series on elections the Fellows were available so that students could register on the spot either online or using paper forms. They made themselves available on election day to help students who had trouble voting. Zane, Morgan, and Victoria did an excellent job, and those of us who attended their presentation were very impressed by their passion and their professionalism. The future is in good hands with these young people.

Another illustration is the fact that one of our high school interns for this year, Mariah Drexler, was recently featured in *The Daily Item*, along with one of her classmates, Erin DeSantis, for leading a project called *Teach Against Trafficking*. They partnered with Transitions of PA and the Community Zone to submit a grant application to seek funding to create human trafficking prevention toolkits, which will be distributed at many different kinds of businesses along Routes 11 and 15 in Snyder, Union, and Northumberland counties. The community should be very proud of these young women.

DECEMBER FORUM

Professor Nick Clark posited during his "Understanding the Election Results" Forum talk on December 18th, that the economy and the unpopularity of Joe Biden had a lot to do with the election outcome. Professor Clark demonstrated how this is consistent with literature and research on elections and voting behavior. He believes Democrats might have gotten more traction by separating more from the incumbent administration and presenting a candidate who identified as a change from the last two administrations. But, it would not have been for sure even then, that they might have won. He said voters' memories are short. At the end of the day, the structure of the race was ultimately against the incumbent Democrats. It will be fascinating and illuminating to follow post-election studies of media influence and new channels reaching different audiences.
