I was in college in the 60's as was my husband. He was drafted and I was busy stamping out disease and pestilence in nursing school. The country was right in the middle of the Vietnam war and major civil unrest. It seemed like there were large protest gatherings daily. At the time I thought the protesting was silly; why would Congress listen to a bunch of ordinary citizens? We students wondered how protesters were getting time off from jobs and work. We were not seeing the bigger picture.

Those who marched to protest the war in Vietnam and also in support of civil rights, felt that the demonstrations were an effective way to raise awareness, pressure the government and ultimately achieve their goals. They felt that the civil rebellion led to very positive outcomes.

MARCH FORUM

The League of Women of Women Voters of Lewisburg Area Forum series will continue on Tuesday, March 18th, 2025, with a talk by Dr. Alan Stolberg, *Nato and the USA: What's in it for US?*. Dr. Stolberg is the U.S. Coordinator for the Department of Defense (DoD)/NATO Defense Education Enhancement Program (DEEP), helping coordinate and orchestrate U.S. government assistance and support to NATO partner nation professional military education institutions on a global basis.

League members and the public are invited to attend the presentation. League Forums are held from 10:30-11:30a.m. at the Public Library for Union County Community Room, 255 Reitz Boulevard, Lewisburg, PA 17837. Doors open at 10a.m. All are welcome and encouraged to bring a friend.

JANUARY FORUM

In January, Tanya Dynda from the CSIU spoke to a crowd of about 35 members and Forum guests about Artificial Intelligence (AI). We learned how it's being used, and is helpful in our daily lives and in the workplace. AI has revolutionized our lives. It's a valuable tool for all and present everywhere, including Google Maps, Roomba vacuums and Amazon Alexa technology assistance. It has vast potential to further automate tasks and improve decisionmaking.

AI presents opportunities for innovation but it comes with ethical and practical concerns about fairness, privacy, and societal impact. When a query can be made specific, useful results can enhance human creativity. Results are dependent on the data points found in the search. Much like the potential for human research, results can yield bad or biased information if the query isn't well thought out.

FEBRUARY FORUM

On February 18th, Professor Michael James, Associate Dean of the Bucknell Faculty and member of the Political Science Department, spoke at the Lewisburg League of Women Voters' Forum, on immigration policy in the United States. He began by using exit polls from recent elections to demonstrate that among all political groups in the United States there is increasing opposition to current immigration policy. Based on recent data, he illustrated increasing trends worldwide to limit immigration. He used Canada as one example of an area where support for immigration has declined significantly within all political parties.

Professor James then discussed the various categories of immigration, for example, making clear the difference between asylum seekers and refugees. He described the creation of birthright citizenship, with the Fourteenth Amendment, along with the 77-page clarification from the case United States v. Wang Kim, in 1899. That case defined two allowable exceptions to birthright citizenship: (British) invaders' children and the children of diplomats.

Professor James addressed current immigration patterns in the US, pointing out that increasingly immigrants have been coming from Central America, as well as China and India. There has no amnesty since Ronald Reagan in 1985 so anyone who has entered since then could be subject to deportation. He pointed out that no one who has entered the United States illegally since then has a legal right to stay, but they might have a moral right to remain. He believes there are just and unjust ways to deport people. Finally, he mentioned that throughout the world there are many countries with walls, and wondered if that might help to control the flow of immigration.

Last day to REGISTER to vote or to change party affiliation before the April primary.	May 5
Last day to APPLY for a mail-in or civilian ABSENTEE ballot	May 13
Last day for County Boards of Elections to receive voted mail-in and civilian absentee ballots (must be received by 8:00pm)	May 20
MUNICIPAL PRIMARY In-Person voting: Polls open from 7:00am to 8:00pm	May 20
First day to register to vote after the election	May 21
Last day for County Board of Elections to receive voted military and overseas absentee ballots (submitted for delivery no later than 11:59p.m. on May 19th)	May 27
