As this new group moves forward with their work, the most important thing they will need, and the one thing that is imperative to any change, is an open mind. They will need to side step the pitfalls of: "We tried that and it didn't work", "We've never done it that way", and the biggest of them all, "We've always done it that way."

I know I can speak for the entire membership of the League in offering any help and support that they may need. I, for one, am looking forward to seeing how this will look a year from now!

### **MARCH FORUM**

Dr. Allen Stolberg of the Rand Corporation spoke at the March 18<sup>th</sup> Forum of the League of Women Voters of the Lewisburg Area on the topic *NATO*, *Ukraine and the USA: What's in it for US?* Dr. Stolberg was a senior member of the NATO mission to the Ukraine in the week of March 23, 2025.

Dr. Stolberg gave a history of the NATO alliance explaining that it represented a common democratic outlook and served a valuable military purpose as a multiplier of forces. He explained the financial contributions of NATO in comparison to the financial contributions of the United States. He discussed the three situations in which NATO assisted the United States in substantive ways.

Dr. Stolberg also presented a brief history of the relations between Russia and the Ukraine emphasizing the period after 1954 when the Ukraine became an independent state. He discussed the history of Putin's relationship with NATO starting with the early period of his reign when Putin wanted to join NATO. He concluded with a discussion of the amount of money we have spent defending Ukraine.

It was an extremely dense talk. This summary gives only a slight sense of the amount of material covered.
