The Special Town Election is the first election since the changes to precincts and districts resulting from the 2020 Census. There have been changes to precincts and all of Precinct 4 has a new polling location.

Before going to the polls, please check your precinct and polling location by viewing the precinct map online or the new precinct app at the town web site <u>www.concordma.gov/vote</u> or in person at either of Concord's post offices.

The deadline for registration for this election was January 14th.

Absentee voting

Absentee ballots for this election are now available upon signed application or written request.

A mailing in mid-January from the town to each Concord household included an absentee ballot application for all elections held in Concord in 2022 which can also be accessed on the Town website: <u>www.concordma.gov/vote</u>.


The deadline to apply for an absentee ballot by mail is Friday, January 28, 2022 at 5:00 pm. After Friday the 28th, you can still apply in person to vote absentee at the Town Clerk's Office up until 12 noon on Wednesday, February 2, 2022.

Absentee ballots must be returned to the Town Clerk's Office by 8:00 pm on February 2nd to be counted.

On the ballot: Question 1 Funding the building of a new Concord Middle School

The construction of a new middle school in Concord has been a topic of study and planning since 2018. Now designed, the Town must vote to appropriate the funds for the building phase of the project. The approval from the Town requires two votes: a two-thirds majority at a Special Town Meeting (held January 20th 2022) and a simple majority at the Special Town Election on Thursday, February 3rd 2022. The vote at Town Meeting received an ample two-thirds majority.

Questions for the Candidates:

- 1. Why are you are running for the School Committee and what qualifications will you bring to the position?
- 2. What issues do you think will be the most pressing for the School Committee in the upcoming year? What is your current view on those issues?
- 3. How do you plan to contribute to the on-going Middle School project?

Question 1: Why are you are running for the School Committee and what qualifications will you bring to the position?

Todd Benjamin:

As a father of 3 kids in our schools – 1 in CMS and 2 in elementary school – a Cub Scout leader, and a Little League coach, I want to continue to be an advocate for our kids, our families, and our community.

<u>Qualifications:</u> I have a deep record of service to our Town that qualifies me to be on the School Committee. My experience includes:

- 1. Twice elected to the Concord Housing Authority
- 2. Chair of the Capital Planning Task Force
- 3. Chair of the Affordable Housing Funding Committee

In addition, I have attended or viewed the recording of every School Committee meeting since December 2020.

Results from these roles include:

1) Speaking up for our kids and our families, following the science, and advocating for our kids' education. This included coordinating parents to support our kids, the administration, and teachers by starting a petition to get our kids back to



school full-time last year. This garnered almost 400 Concordian signatures.

2) Driving changes in efficiency, transparency, and communication leading to greater citizen involvement while at the Concord Housing Authority.

3) Consistently speaking out about the tax burden facing families and seniors. While supportive of the middle school, I shared my concerns about the high cost. I applaud the CMSBC in finding an additional savings of \$1.7MM to help lower the cost.

4) Actively worked for and implemented greater diversity, equity, and inclusion in Town. Worked with the Finance Committee, Select Board, and voters to pass 4 articles at Town Meeting promoting diversity, equity, and inclusion.

5) Experience working with state and federal budgets.

Carrie Rankin:

My husband, Jonathan, and I moved to Concord in 2013 before we had kids. We were excited about the vibrant community and, certainly, the incredible schools. We have had three children here – Cooper (8), Leah (6) and Micaela (2). I'm running for School Committee because I want to give back to this place my family and I call home.

I have spent my professional career working in government, most recently serving as Congressman Seth Moulton's chief of staff. I believe in the importance of public service, the power of good leadership and the critical role an education plays in developing tomorrow's leaders. Here in town, I am a poll worker. I also serve as the communications chair at Concord Children's Center and I am an involved parent at Thoreau Elementary School. I have also worked with First Parish in Concord to help welcome and support the needs of an Afghan family seeking refuge in our area.

I would be honored to serve this community as the newest member of the Concord School Committee.

Question 2: What issues do you think will be the most pressing for the School Committee in the upcoming year? What is your current view on those issues?

Todd Benjamin:

<u>Students first</u> - The educational, social, & emotional wellbeing of our kids should be our top priority. We need to diligently work to address these needs. A key component of this is prudently using the \$1.2MM in federal funds the schools received. I am currently evaluating ways to do this.

<u>Personnel</u> – Having the right people in the right roles to support students and staff is important. My experience on boards dealing with personnel topics will help here. This is an area where transparency and communication between the School Committee, the administration, and the town will be important.

<u>Fiscal responsibility with the best</u> <u>educational outcomes for our kids</u>. - We all want the best for our kids. But we must strike a balance with the other needs of our community and with the burden on



taxpayers. I will continue my focus on fiscal responsibility on the School Committee.

Carrie Rankin:

There are a number of issues that I believe are of critical importance, including:

- <u>Covid:</u> I have been so grateful to live in Concord where the Superintendent and School Committee's science-based approach kept our kids both safe and in school. Still, the impact of covid has taken a toll on families, kids, teachers, the entire community in ways that we will be navigating for years to come.
- <u>Mental Health</u>: We were approaching a mental health crisis before covid and we are in one now. Prioritizing mental health resources for children of all ages will be critical in the coming years.
- <u>Teachers:</u> Teachers are our greatest asset and many are exhausted. We need to proactively address teacher burnout and retention as a School Committee and community.
- <u>Diversity, Equity and Inclusion</u>: Dr. Laurie Hunter has made DEI a priority of her administration. I fully support her efforts and will work to create policies that ensure all children and families feel, and truly are, welcome in Concord schools.
- Fiscal sustainability. I understand that the decisions the School Committee makes impact the entire community and I take that responsibility seriously. I will look at the impact on the entirety of Concord - not just those with school aged children - when making financial decisions.

These are tough issues to which there are no perfect solutions. I will approach this position with curiosity and a willingness to listen and learn, compassion for our kids and teachers, transparency, and in collaboration with town leaders, my colleagues on the School Committee and all citizens in this community.

Question 3: How do you plan to contribute to the on-going Middle School project?

Todd Benjamin:

Much work for the middle school project lies ahead. I will contribute my background in real estate finance and development to helping maintain fiscal prudence of the project. I will also contribute my experience with solar power – both from having it on my home and from serving on boards where solar power was implemented on institutional/commercial buildings.

My background and experiences prepare me to meaningfully contribute to the pressing issues facing the School Committee and our Town now. We need to make the most of this 1-year term.

Carrie Rankin:

The debate in town was less about the need for a new Middle School, and more about the design and cost of it. The process - led by the Concord Middle School Building Committee - was transparent, thorough, and it resulted in unanimous support from



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the Finance Committee, School Committee and Select Board.

As the project continues to develop, I will work with this same collaborative, transparent spirit to ensure we build a Middle School that supports student achievement and success, is beneficial to the whole town - and not just those with school age children, and uses sustainable materials to protect our planet.
