Wednesday, February 12th, 2025 "Civic Engagement"

r. Daisy Martin will be our speaker via Zoom for this timely and important topic. Civic engagement is the act of working to improve the quality of life in a community. It can involve political and non-political activities, such as volunteering, voting, or participating in public meetings. Dr. Martin is Founding Director of The History and Civics Project at UC Santa Cruz. She currently works with K-12 History and Civics teachers, and has extensive experience as a teacher in California public schools.



Dr. Martin recently helped Jefferson Union School District (northern San Mateo County) in implementing the California

State Seal of Civic Engagement (SSCE) program. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction awards SSCE recognition to public school students in grades eleven or twelve who demonstrate excellence in civics education and participation, as well as an understanding of the US Constitution, the California Constitution, and the democratic system of government.

We should be able to name the ten Monterey


candidate forums, Pros & Cons, Vote411, and staffing polling places. What more can we do? We need to take a deeper dive into understanding our own communities.

At our first Lunch & Learn session this January, Jeannette Tuitele-Lewis, President and CEO of the Big Sur Land Trust (BSLT), gave an eye-opening presentation on the wide range and scope of the work of the Trust, including projects addressing land conservation, land stewardship, and community programs, which are spread throughout Monterey County, not just in Big Sur.

Highlights of the Trust's 47 years of projects include the Carmel River Floodplain Restoration and Environmental Enhancement Project (CRFREE), Carr Lake (and the park opening soon in Salinas), the Basin Ranch near Arroyo Seco, Tarpy Flats/Hiss property along Highway 68, the Ferrini Ranch, and numerous others undertaken in collaboration with a wide range of community partners, including tribal groups.

MASS DEPORTATIONS IN MONTEREY COUNTY?



he League of Women Voters position on immigration includes, among other things, 1) ensure fair treatment under the law for all persons and 2) meet US economic, business and employment needs (Iwvc.org/position/position-immigration/). This is in line with

the **Know Your Rights** campaign in Monterey County due to concerns about immigrant workers and their families facing mass deportation threats.

The Monterey County Sheriff's Office follows the California Values Act and the TRUTH Act which are supposed to ensure the rights and dignity of immigrants while promoting transparency.

The TRUTH Act is a California law prohibiting law enforcement from turning undocumented people over to ICE who were not arrested for a serious crime. Monterey County Tina, Sheriff Nieto has stressed that the role of law enforcement is not to enforce federal immigration laws, but to protect all residents and build trust regardless of immigration status. Schools will only comply with immigration officials if they have a judicial or court warrant.

Local employers are also concerned with the possibility of immigration raids. Rick Aldinger

of the Monterey County Hospitality Association says, "We don't know what's going to happen."

These matters could affect a lot of people. Hopefully it turns out to be much ado about nothing. **Norm Groot** of the

Monterey County Farm Bureau estimates that 30-50% of the county's agricultural workforce is undocumented. Mass deportation would devastate the county's biggest industry. Stay tuned as this plays out in the lives and livelihoods of Monterey County residents.

Know Your Rights Red Card, English version

You have constitutional rights:

DO NOT OPEN THE DOOR if an immigration agent is knocking on the door.

- DO NOT ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS from an immigration agent if they try to talk to you. You have the right to remain silent.
- DO NOT SIGN ANYTHING without first speaking to a lawyer. You have the right to speak with a lawyer.
- If you are outside of your home, ask the agent if you are free to leave and if they say yes, leave calmly.
- GIVE THIS CARD TO THE AGENT. If you are inside of your home, show the card through the window or slide it under the door.

I do not wish to speak with you, answer your questions, or sign or hand you any documents based on my 5th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution.

I do not give you permission to enter my home based on my 4th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution unless you have a warrant to enter, signed by a judge or magistrate with my name on it that you slide under the door.

I do not give you permission to search my belongings based on my 4th Amendment rights. I choose to exercise my constitutional rights. These cards are available to citizens and noncitizens alike.



The Freedom of Information Act is a federal law that gives the public the right to request records from federal agencies. The law was enacted in 1966 and is found in section 552, Title 5 of the United States Code (justice.gov/oip/freedominformation-act-5-usc-552).

Join the **LWVUS** Litigation team and their partners at American Oversight (americanoversight.org) to learn all about our right to request government records.

American Oversight is a team of lawyers, researchers, communicators, and others working



across the country to expose misconduct and hold government accountable.

This seminar will include: types of records requests, how to draft and submit records requests, how to engage with agencies, special issues related to records requests, and answer your

questions as time allows.

"Cracking the Code" promises to be a great tool for the League's State Presidents and Leaders, Board Members, Advocacy Chairs, Local Leaders, and all League Members interested in holding government officials accountable!




