Guest Speaker, Jeannette Tuitele-Lewis, is President and CEO of Big Sur Land Trust. Under her leadership since 2014, the Trust has doubled its operations, and expanded its programs and partnerships with a greater focus on community-centered, land-based projects with multiple conservation and social benefits.



Prior to this, Jeannette worked for **Sierra Foothill Conservancy** for nine years, serving as **Executive Director** for the last five. During her tenure, the organization reached significant land

conservation goals, developed working partnerships with local indigenous tribes, and became **Land Trust Alliance** accredited.

Born in California, Jeannette spent much of her youth between the West Coast and the Pacific

Islands. Upon graduating from the University of Hawai'i at Manoa with a degree in Botany, she worked in the American Samoan Islands for the Community and Natural Resources Division, documenting medicinal uses of plants by traditional healers, worked with local farmers, and coordinated restoration works with village chiefs.

Jeannette received a Master's Degree in Forest Science from Oregon State University, where her studies integrated agro-forestry systems, land tenure, and traditional ecological knowledge. Following graduate school, Jeannette worked as a Forest Science Technician, collecting data on carbon storage in old growth forests across the Pacific Northwest.

Jeannette is Immediate Past Chair, Board of the California Council of Land Trusts, and on the National Leadership Council of the Land Trust Alliance. She also serves on the Peggy and Jack Baskin Foundation Board, which supports strategies to reach gender and racial equity.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE JANUARY 2025



The League of Women Voters is opportunity. The League is a vehicle through which members can contribute to civic life and learn new skills. One of the League's slogans is "democracy is not a spectator sport."

The League is a grassroots organization that can have an effect at the local, state, and national levels. A few years ago, I attended a conference under the title "Future of California Elections."

Representatives from the California League were there. But most of the other participants were from think tanks, legal organizations, government, and academics.

It struck me that all these other organizations worked to influence election procedures through court files, legislation, lobbying, white papers,

or mass advertising. The League was the only group there that could do community outreach everywhere in the state by meeting citizens face-to-face.

I would encourage you to get involved in League public policy or voter services, for which the League can prepare you. Take for example, candidate forums: decades ago, I attended my first forum. Though I don't remember the position to be filled, there were multiple candidates and a buzzing crowd. The League

moderator Judy Higgerson was

keeping the proceedings on track, but the task required some deftness on her part.

I thought to myself, "Wow, I could never do that," and at that time, thought it was true. But I kept

volunteering for candidate forum jobs: timer, runner, question sorter, and finally moderator. Ironically I found that while the moderator is the most visible role, the question sorter is the most difficult task!

It is gratifying when the League can facilitate forums for offices that don't receive much public

attention, such as special districts and school districts. No other civic group has the knowledge, resources, and interest to initiate such forums.

If your interest is more on the public policy side, the best place to start is attending the **Natural Resources Committee**, which meets on Zoom monthly (see meeting update below).

Even if the topic is not your primary interest, the value in attending committee meetings is that there will be other attendees with long experience dealing with local governments, environmental impact reports, general plans, and state agencies.

Just by observing, you will learn about the tempo of government, the jargon, and the players. This background will be useful when applied to any other policy area.

For another opportunity, read **Sharon Miller's** article about the **Observer Corps** below. League Observers are a long-standing activity that

had fallen by the wayside. But our recent experience with observing redistricting meetings has reminded us of its usefulness. The first step to these activities follows the title of Yogi Berra's book: "You Can Observe A Lot By Just Watching." Initially you need to learn the players (such as council or board members, staff, vested interests, public activists) and

the local issues (e.g., Sand City looking forward to getting express bus service to Marina). From there it's like watching reality television, but with stronger purpose than who gets the rose!

Note that meetings can be monitored in person, via Zoom, by watching post-meeting videos, or by

ear ye! Hear ye! Your LWV is recruiting volunteers for a resurrected **Observer Corps**. Local media doesn't have the resources to follow the actions of important boards, councils and other jurisdictions, so LWV members are filling in the gaps across the country.

Here's a great opportunity, whether you're new to the League or have been a member for years. By putting in a few hours a month you can help promote government transparency and accountability at the same time as you educate youself and your fellow Leaguers.

From the County Board of Supervisors to City Councils to School Boards to Airport or Water Boards—what geographic area or issue are you interested in? This is the same model we recently used for monitoring redistricting efforts around the county. For example, I intend to monitor the **Pacific Grove City Council** on setting up district elections and on DEI, and am watching the Board of Supervisors regarding sheriff oversight.

The role of observers is to witness, record, and report back to the rest of our membership.

We don't share personal opinions at these meetings, but flag issues that may stir the LWV Board or President to respond. We will also be building awareness of the LWV by identifying ourselves as part of the LWV Observer Corps. Guidelines and

"I've been using the League's information to vote for many years and finally decided to join," she explains. "It made sense to me. I had a realization that I would like to more actively support voting and democracy."


When she first joined, Sandy says she "got the opportunity to work with Shelley Sweet and


When she's not dealing with family, property management or League matters, Sandy says she and Alec just enjoy living in this area, especially walking their dogs on the beach.


California law protects the rights of voters who are hospitalized on election stay. If you would like to vote by absentee ballot on Tuesday, November 5, Montage Health Foundation volunteers and Auxiliary members are here to help.

Please notify your nurse and they will send a volunteer to assist you.

GUIDELINES:

- You must complete your absence ballot by 11:30 a.m. on Tuesday, November 5
- You must be a U.S. citizen and resident of Monterey County.
- You must already be registered to vote in Monterey County.
- . You must independently determine how you vate; volunteers will not assist with voting selections.
- You must not have already voted by absence ballot in the current. election; your other absentee ballot will be voided

NEW LWV MEMBERSHIP SYSTEM

he League of Women Voters is switching to a new "member portal" for all Leagues across the country. No action by members is needed right now, but here's an overview of what these changes mean for you:

When the system launches this month, you will receive an email to log in to the portal, but you will not be asked to renew until a year after your most recent renewal (for many members, the next renewal will be June 30, 2024). You will have the option to sign up to auto-renew annually, and your membership will last a year after your last renewal. Once you have access to the portal, you can update your own information, including contact information.

When it comes time to renew, you will receive an email reminder two months prior to your renewal date. Dues will no longer be a fixed rate but will be pay-what-you-can. The recommended amount for all members across the country will be \$75, but members can pay any amount with a I minimum \$20, including the current dues rate.

I Under the current system, our LWV Monterey County pays a fixed rate per member to LWV California and to LWVUS. Under the new system, a percentage of dues will go to State and National Leagues and the rest to Local Leagues. When



you renew, you can make additional contribution directly to LWV of Monterey County if you wish.

There will still be an option to renew by check for members who don't use the Internet. Members who can access the portal are encouraged to renew online.

We will keep you informed as we have new and relevant information. Please contact me with any auestions.
