# LWV CALIFORNIA Water Group Meeting Notes

April 11, 2023, 8 - 9 am Provided by Betsy Patterson

#### Legislation to watch:

AB1337 - Places limit on water diversion, even for well owners from before 1914.

SB3 - Expands water shut off protection, requiring water districts with 2000 or fewer clients to comply (effective date 8/2/2024).

**Flood management** - Northern California water issues are very different from So Cal's

- 1. Tulare Lake basin is at risk for flooding depending on snow melt rate.
- 2. Snow pack is being monitored by LIDAR\* to anticipate melting rate.
- 3. Diversion flooding of agricultural areas being encouraged to increase groundwater.
- 4. Special project (ongoing since 1983) by single individual to increase the aquifer; his only access to water is with agricultural flooding, does not have access to diversion sources.
- 5. Klamath River has four dams that are going to be taken down, the first one this fall, then the others next year.

#### **Water Contaminants**

Question was asked if contaminants could be absorbed through the skin Response: "Use of water produced from fracking can affect crops" (no study cited) and "we wear gloves in labs because contaminants can go through skin." It was noted that spinach is a crop that absorbs heavy metals and is used to reclaim soil (but the spinach with heavy metals is supposed to be burned, not eaten). Also, pumpkin and sunflowers can absorb contaminants. Other potential contaminants include uranium, arsenic, selenium.

Question: Do organic growers have to check what is in the water they use? Someone said they thought it was "voluntary."

Answer: It was suggested that a new study was needed to look at the uptake by plants of contaminants in water produced from fracking. There has been a study but "wasn't very good."

# Observer Report #1

Congressman Salud Carbajal, CD24 Ventura Town Hall Wednesday, April 12<sup>th</sup> San Buenaventura City Hall Observer Reporting: Matty Park

Representative Carbajal introduced himself to his new constituents. He immigrated to the U.S. from Mexico at a young age with his parents, who were farm workers in the Bracero program. They initially worked in Arizona and then moved to Oxnard, where he grew up, did well in school, graduated from UCSB, and then spent 8 years in the Marines.

Representative Carbajal served as a Santa Barbara County Supervisor for 12 years before being elected to Congressional District 24 in 2016, after Representative Lois Capps retired. The district contains all of Santa Barbara County and parts of San Luis Obispo and Ventura counties. Before redistricting in 2022 it had only a sliver of the City of Ventura, but now it contains all of Ventura and Ojai. A new district office is planned soon in Ventura, and he hopes it can be in City Hall.

Representative Carbajal spoke about his committee assignments and accomplishments, followed by a question-and-answer period.

#### Committees:

- Armed Services (as a Marine veteran)
- Transportation and Infrastructure (ranking member on Coast Guard and Maritime Transportation subcommittee)
- Agriculture (son of farm workers who also values the needs of farmers)

Accomplishments:



In summary, Representative Carbajal has worked on, and voted for, many bills to support citizens and the economy during the pandemic, reduce inflation (has been going down for 9 months now), lower drug costs, incentivize science and manufacturing in America, improve shipping regulations to fight supply chain problems, improve maritime safety, create 12 million jobs with lowest unemployment since we first sent men to the moon, encourage red-flag laws in local communities, fund healthcare for veterans exposed to toxic substances, incentivize energy efficient homes, equalize firefighter benefits, support the needs of local military bases, businesses, and agriculture, and improve infrastructure.

During Q&A he said he supports a law to codify Roe v Wade, is in leadership of an immigration task force that is trying to develop an immigration bill that can pass the house and contains as much as possible of President Biden's agenda, is trying to decouple appropriations from the debt ceiling, and supports wind farms. He also said the FAA is looking at policy for drones.

# **Observer Report #2**

Ventura County Board of Supervisors Tuesday, April 25, 2023 Observer Reporting: Sharon Crane

The Ventura County Continuum of Care Alliance(VC COC Alliance) presented their 2023 State of Homelessness in Ventura County. This document can be found on their

website <u>HERE</u>. It was very thorough and presented well. The areas covered were Point-in-Time Count Data, At-Risk Populations, VC CoC Homeless Service System, Housing Resources and Challenges and finally 2023 Draft recommendations.

The Point-in-Time was broken down into Who is Counted, a Map of the Count, Totals from 2018 to 2023 as well as broken down into various subcategories. It is a very readable and informative report. The number of homeless has increased 9.1% to 2,441 for 2023 count even though there has been a very positive increase in housing and services. The 211-call data is also presented.

The 2022 System Performance Data compared Housing Placements, Housing Retention and Average Length of Time Homeless, as to the actual and the target. Housing Retention surpassed the target. The other two areas need further work to accomplish the target.

Housing Resources and Challenges was very informative showing utilized, available and underdevelopment. Supportive Housing is the largest underdevelopment category. The 2023-2024 Housing Pipeline gave areas and dates for completion.

They completed their presentation with the 2023 VC CoC Board Recommendations, which were: Achieve zero Veteran homelessness in 2024; Expand transitional housing programs for TAY(youth); Reduce chronically homeless adults by 2024 with new additions of supportive housing; Encourage each jurisdiction to review their strategies to reduce homelessness; Expand the VC CoC Workgroup to partner people with lived experience for recommendations; Reduce the number of first time homeless by expanding prevention and diversion strategies.

VC CoC announced that they are awaiting a commissioned Ventura County Homelessness Community Survey what should be completed in June. The BOS agreed to wait until the survey is complete so they would have all the information to take further action on the homelessness issue.

The presentation was excellent and I would encourage you to read the full report on VC CoC's Alliance website. It appears that there is good coordination between agencies and the County. The BOS seem to be thoroughly interested and involved in working to solve the homeless issue. The plans have covered the necessary issues that need to be addressed to be effective. There also appears to be a lot of forward movement and commitment in resolving the homelessness issue. I would encourage the League Homelessness Committee to discuss both the 2023 State of Homelessness in Ventura County report and the Ventura County Homelessness Community survey to assist in our strategic planning efforts.
